To Erect New Building

Mr. Sparks pointed out that people of all ages need the services of the C.N.I.B. Children and their parents require help and advice; those of middle age should be given the opportunity of learning occupations, while those elderly people who sometimes live under trying conditions need companionship, a home and recreation. Some areas in Canada have buildings where those deprived of sight live, where occupations are taught and recreation provided.

The offices and shops in Toronto have become woefully inadequate so the C.N.I.B. propose to erect suitable buildings to carry out a greatly expanded program on 10 acres which have been purchased just south of Sunnybrook hospital.

To provide funds for this project, a campaign will be carried on in April. If it is to be successful, the co-operation of all interested will be needed.
