

Fourth Night School Ends As Crowd Sees Displays

The fourth year of Halton night school classes was brought to a climax this Tuesday evening at the annual Open Night when crowds admired the attractive displays, heard most encouraging reports and applauded fashion shows and speakers in the Milton High School auditorium.

"I don't know of any project in my 19 years in the county that has met with greater success than the night school," J. K. Whitelock, Halton agricultural representative, said happily.

In appreciation of his work with the classes, Mr. Whitelock was presented with a smoking stand, desk set and double floor reading lamp by Miss Jean Peterson, assisted by Brock Harris, Frank Chisholm and Cedric Harrop.

Applause filled the auditorium as Mr. Whitelock, well known and very popular throughout Halton, was given these gifts on behalf of those who took advantage of the varied courses available.

Total enrollment in the county was 458 at courses in Milton, 57 at Acton and 51 in Georgetown.

A Woodley chairman of the Halton night school committee, also declared that Halton had indeed had a "successful series of night schools."

Next attendance was in Miss Taylor's and Mrs. Brown's making class, it was announced. The group had a percentage attendance of 83.5.

Second was Mrs. Dale's metalcraft class with 83.1 and last for third place with 82.5 and 82.4 per cent were Mrs. Haught's smoking class and Mr. Tappin's metalcraft class.

Average attendance in all the classes at Milton—27 of them was 78.5 per cent. From rural parts of the county came 88 per cent of the enrollment, with 94 from urban centers. Classes at Acton and Georgetown had percentage urban enrollment.

Grand total of enrollment at all three centres was the highest in the four years of night school.

No meeting was made of night school next week.

The treasurer's report showed a balance in hand of \$298.94.

Fashion parades were as usual, a highlight of the program. This year fashion shows between class displays added variety. The major feature was Edna Parsonson, Laela Passmore, Lucia Pelletier, Nowell Starr, Sharon Cartwright and E. E. Martin. Mrs. A. R. Elliott accompanied on the piano.

Yesterdays modelled sweet smocked dresses and children's garments made during the season. Teachers in these groups were Mrs. Helen Haught, Mrs. Margaret Taylor and Mrs. Helen Huntley. Other classes showing the attractive clothing they had made were elementary clothing, taught by Mrs. Ruby Demaray, elementary and advanced clothing, taught by Mrs. Mabel Anderson, advanced clothing, taught by Mrs. Audrey McConachie and tailoring, taught by Mrs. Florence Taylor and Mrs. Jean Dixon.

The night school this year necessitated a staff of 29 each evening, three at Acton and three at Georgetown.

Plan Blind Centre To Serve Halton

Miss Elinore Burns, who has been prominent in work for blind Canadians for more than 30 years, has been named coordinating chairman of the counties division for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind Building Fund.

A chairman for Halton county will be named soon, Miss Burns said, and community chairmen will be appointed in all major centres of the county, she added.

A public appeal for \$3,150,000 will be made by the Canadian National Institute for the Blind in late April. The Building Fund will finance an urgently needed rehabilitation and service centre for the blind in Halton, Ontario.

The centre will play an important part in the lives of all persons in these five counties," Miss Burns said. "Not only will it make rehabilitation of blind persons more efficient but it will aid in the C.N.I.B.'s ceaseless crusade for blindness prevention," the counties chairman added.
