Merchant Marine Three-Ship Fleet

Halton Junior Farmer Choristers Are Involved in Stand Collapse at London

Halton junior farmers rehearsing a massed choir selection in London Thursday evening of last week, were among over 100 young men who fell in a tangled heap when two bleachers collapsed.

Although the choristers were cut and shaken, only one was unable to continue with the evening's program of music. A young farmer from Middlesex county, he suffered a broken ankle.

None of the Halton men was seriously injured. Rev. Young, padre at the Ontario Agricultural College, was among those who declared the accident to be "one of the luckiest" he had ever seen.

After usher, attendants and St. John's ambulance corps members rushed to the collapsed stands and unscrambled injuries were deemed relatively slight. Dr. Roy Fenwick, who had been leading the massed choir at the time of the accident, was able to smile and declared it was the first time he had ever seen a section of a choir suddenly disappear.

Arton Man Cut

In the practice about an hour, before the evening's performance in the Manufacturers' Life Building, four county choirs from Perth, Middlesex, Elgin and Halton were singing "Canada" by Dr. Fenwick. The girls were standing on the regular tiered platform, but about 10 rows of young men had mounted the wooden bleachers brought in from the fair grounds, which had been placed behind the girls to give height to the men's sections.

The Ontario junior farmers' annual choir festival was held in conjunction with the Middlesex county seed fair.

Mac Sprout, Acton choir member who suffered a cut head, explained that the stands seemed to suddenly move to one side and within seconds were down. One Halton man, Frank Wilson of Nanticoke, exhibited remarkable quick thinking and caught hold of an overhead steel girder. Another clutched at a pipe. After their fellow singers were thrown down, they were left dangling and had to be helped down with ladders.


