Col. W. Head Had Military Career

After an illness of two weeks, Col. William Head of Everton died Sunday in Guelph General Hospital. Col. Head, who was born in Eramosa township and lived in the district almost all his life, was in his 87th year.

He spent a short time overseas with the army and in Guelph. He had an outstanding military career. He joined the 34th Battalion in World War I as a private and rose to the rank of major. After the war, he served with the Wellington Rifles and was elevated to the rank of colonel. During the war he served in many of the leading campaigns. He was at both the battle of Ypres and Somme and was invalided back to England.

While in England, he was engaged in the construction of aerodromes and was connected with both the army and the navy.

He returned in 1919 and was employed with the Soldiers' Settlement Board, an organization similar to the D.V.A. He later joined the staff of the Agricultural Development Board. At one time he was president of the Guelph Rifle Club.

At the time of his death Col. Head resided with his wife on a 100 acre farm in Everton and in addition, operated a general store there. Col. Head was also postmaster of the village.

Col. Head was one of a family of eight children and was the last surviving member of that family. In 1903 he married the former Margaret D. Miller in Knox church in Barrie Hill. In March of last year, the couple celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

Surviving besides his widow are two sons, Kitchener of Toronto and Charles of Weston, one daughter, Mrs. Fred Murray (Mary) of Guelph and three grandchildren, Valerie Jean, Terry Lynn and Donald.

Funeral services were held at Ross McLanaghan funeral home, Wednesday and interment was in Eden Mills cemetery.
