The Ontario government will provide an annual grant of \$5,000 in each of the next four years to the Champlain Society to assist in a research program on the French and early English periods of Ontario history. Premier Leslie M. Frost announces. The grant has been made subject to the approval of the legislature.

Discussing the research program Mr. Frost said, "There are many untold events concerning the visits of the first white men, their explorations, the foundations of trade routes, the establishment of industry and home life, on which information has never been collected. Many priceless, original records about these are being unwittingly destroyed or otherwise irretrievably lost.

"We want to help build up interest in local history and get people interested in preserving local records. Ontario has an interesting and challenging history by Dr. W. K. Lamb federal archivist, who is president of the Champlain Society.

Sale of Easter Seals Provides Funds For Various Services to Handicapped

To the 9,000 handicapped children scattered throughout Ontario, on farms, in city homes or in remote northern hamlets, the sale of Easter Seals brings treatment and training, a possibility of independence and relief from the physical handicaps that birth, illness or accident left them.

Last year the Ontario Society for Crippled Children whose only appeal for funds is made in the annual sale of Easter Seals by nearly 200 service clubs carried out the biggest program in all its history. This year the 9,000 youngsters who are listed on their roles as "active" cases has increased. The objective in this year's Easter Seals campaign, March 18 to April 18, is \$500,000.

The organization that cares for these children is amazingly small. A lightly knit office staff at headquarters in Toronto, a score of highly-trained nurses, a corps of volunteer doctors and an army of public-spirited citizens who give freely of their time.

Services Performed

This work takes several forms. There is a nursing service, made up of 21 graduate nurses, each of whom has taken a special post-graduate course in orthopedics and is authorized by special Act of the Ontario Legislature to wear the title Orthopedic Consultant. These nurses visit the homes of handicapped children, teach the parents how to administer therapy treatment or direct the child to medical attention.
