increase of about \$500 to a total premium of \$13,374. Mr. Cowan explained that in Halton losses over the past five years had been \$14,000, with premiums during that time of over \$3,000.

Council asked him to submit a draft of legislation for submission to the Ontario Legislature when he explained several cases had been upheld where the county was held negligent for tax roads.

A representative of the Lorne Scots regiment addressed council seeking the annual grant of \$500 for the regiment and \$500 for the brass band. He reported on the year's activities and pointed out the band was now in red jackets.

Reeve S. Allen, Georgetown, asked the road committee to consider using as good a grade of oil on the county connecting links as was used in the towns. It was noted that the municipalities could apply oil to the county connecting link and bill the county for the work. Warden Stewart suggested the county engineer be consulted on this point before proceeding with the work.

Thomas Bradley, Milton, was named county weed inspector at \$5 a day while on this work and mileage at 10 cents a mile plus expenses. Mr. Bradley was authorized to attend a weed control conference at Guelph at the expense of the county.

A by-law to allow Union Gas Co. of Canada to install its pipe line in Halton was approved with \$50 to be paid for each county road crossed.

Reeve Martin and Deputies Reeves Childs, Milton, were named to represent the county on the Children's Aid Society.

The salaries of the county treasurer was increased to \$3,250. K. M. Langdon, 23 judge of the Juvenile Court to \$600 and Clerk Wm Deans to \$1,200 for his position as clerical assistant to the county engineer. All increases are to be retroactive to January 1.
