"Tuberculosis is not a killer, but an infectious disease which can be effectively treated and cured," declared Dr. S. J. Hawkins, superintendent of Freeport Sanatorium, before the Halton TB and Health Association annual meeting audience of over 60 persons who earlier learned Halton held the highest per capita record of donations in Canada during the 1953 Christmas Seal campaign.

County organizations, of which the Halton group is one, carry out action from the Ontario TB Association, which in turn represents the thinking of the county associations. Dr. Hawkins told his Monday evening hearers who in large part were representatives of Women's Institutes and L.O.D.E. groups in Halton. Other organizations were also represented at the meeting which was held in Trafalgar township hall.

Congratulating the successes of the Halton Association, the president of the Ontario TB Association said the group had "budgeted well" and added emphasis to the importance of work in the field. Dr. Hawkins challenged the organizations represented to aid in their own county the effective educational program, designed for TB prevention.
