Fish & Game Club Sees Films; Y.P.S. Stages Church Play

Under the auspices of the Rockwood Fish and Game club, films were shown in the town hall last Thursday evening with a large attendance, along with a number of young folks. Don Hills had charge of the projection machine.

Some of the films shown dealt with wild life which included water fowl and large numbers of deer in forests in the United States. Another film shown was of local scenes, dealing with a circus in Guelph last year, as well as the calithumpian parade in the village last May. One film depicted trout fishing across Canada, showing some of the speckled beauties.

Another film dealt with scenery on the Pacific coast, especially along the Skeena river in B.C., showing a few of the lumber poles of Indian origin, also the lumbering industry.
