Legume Cultures in Strong Demand

The new form of legume cultures, now being prepared by the Department of Bacteriology at the Ontario Agricultural College, are meeting with popular demand. The demand at the Milton office of the Ontario Department of Agriculture has been keen during the past two or three weeks.

The legume cultures which are now in power form, can be applied to the seed in a few moments, and sell at the normal price of 25 cents per can, which is sufficient to inoculate two bushels of seed. In the opinion of a goodly percentage of Halton farmers these legume cultures are good insurance to securing a catch of small seeds. Inasmuch as only a limited quantity is stocked by the Milton Agricultural Office, those who have not already secured their requirements would be well advised not to wait until the day when they are required.

4-H Agricultural Clubs Organized

The Court House, Milton, was a veritable beehive of young people on Tuesday evening of last week. It was organization night for Halton's three 4-H Calf Clubs and also Halton's 4-H Grain Club. Art Bennett, Associate Agricultural Representative, assisted by local club leaders, had a busy evening. Some 76 young people between the ages of 12 and 20 inclusive, signed up in one of the three Calf Clubs, and 12 in the Grain Club.

Junior Homemakers Visit MacDonald Institute

this they visited various departments of the Ontario Agricultural College and MacDonald Institute. The members of the group were guests of the Ontario Agricultural College for lunch. Needless to add they returned home a tired but happy group.

Halton Junior Dairy Herdmen Complete Project

Two years ago sixteen Halton Junior Farmers enrolled in a new project known as a Junior Dairy Herdmen's Project. To date this is the only group organized in the province—in short, they acted as a guinea pig group to try out the idea. During the two years the young men attended 20 or more meetings where they received lectures from some of the top staff of the Ontario Department of Agriculture in Guelph and Toronto—they also enjoyed a day at Agricultural and Veterinary Colleges, and visited at least one top dairy farm.

In short, they have received instruction from leading authorities on such subjects as feeds and feedings; animal breeding; breeding problems and records; stable renovation; milk houses, disease prevention and control; labour saving studies; milk sanitation, and others.

Judging by the comments heard from those participating, including some of their fathers, it has been one of the most worthwhile projects ever initiated for senior junior farmers. Eleven of the young men completed this two year project, the final session being held on Friday evening last, when Prof. Art Robertson of the Farm Economics Branch at Guelph, discussed Farm Finances with the young men. In recognition of their effort, the young men will be guests of the Ontario Department of Agriculture at a special dinner to be held at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, on May 12th.
