Became Christian At Buchenwald

Alfred H. Wiener, a German Jew who was converted to Christianity in Buchenwald concentration camp, addressed members of the men's clubs of Acton Protestant churches in Knox Presbyterlan church Monday evening. Knox Men's Club was host to those from Acton Baptist church, St. Alban's Anglican church and Acton United church.

Mr. Wiener, who now lives Klora, described vividly his experiences as a German Jew before the war. Anti-Semitism grew stronger and stronger in the country under Hitler's leadership. In 1938 he was taken to Buchenwald, where he became a convert to Christianity. Since he had a sponsor in Canada,

he was released and allowed to emigrate that same year. He now works bringing Christian doctrines before Jewish people in

Canada, with the Hope of Israel Messengers. Clarence Coles, chairman of the


