Canon Rigby Tells Synod Constitution

A meeting of the Anglican lay-delegates to the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara and some of the clergy was held at St. Patrick's church, Guelph on Tuesday evening May 4. The purpose of the meeting was one of instruction and information.

Three laymen are elected by each parish in the diocese as lay-delegates to the annual synod meeting. Many of the lay-delegates at the meeting were new delegates and this kind of meeting was very helpful in preparing to represent their parishes at the synod meetings which begin on May 11. A great many points were explained and clarified by Canon Rigby.

It was felt that the meeting was so worthwhile that one should be held early in the fall to discuss and clarify what had taken place at the synod meetings this year.

Far-Sighted Planning Urged by Deanery Of Anglican Church Meeting in Norval

The clergy of Halton Deanery of the Anglican church met at St. Paul's church, Norval, May 4. The meeting opened with a service of Holy Communion celebrated by the rector of St. Paul's, the Rev. James Maxwell, assisted by the Rural Dean of Halton, the Rev. Canon F. C. Jackson of St. Jude's church, Oakville.

Clergy present were, besides Mr. Maxwell and Canon Jackson, the Rev. R. E. Porritt of Lowville, Nassagaweya and Milton Heights; the Rev. Norman Green of Milton; the Rev. R. E. Price of Acton and Rockwood; the Rev. H. Stewart of Palermo and Bronte; the Rev. C. F. Heathcote of Burlington and the Rev. J. A. Colbeck and the Rev. W. B. Mundy, curates to Canon Jackson of the parish of Oakville.

As the Diocesan Synod is meeting on May 11 and 12 in Hamilton, much of the discussion revolved around the reports of committees of Synod published in the program for Synod.

The Rural Dean, as he did last year, said that he had made a point of seeing that at least one priest and one layman from Halton had been nominated for each of the committees of Synod.

Some time was devoted to consideration of the Every Member Visitation and Canvass, which has many such spectacular results in many parishes. The visitation and canvass is not just a diocesan affair, but is a national undertaking.

The meeting felt that parishes should begin organization of this visitation before the coming of summer, so that when fall comes it can be put into full swing. One comment was made, "if the visitation and canvass isn't organized by the end of June, you might as well forget about it."

Another point brought out was that the visitation and canvass was not one just for money, but one for people as well. It seemed to be the opinion of the meeting that a visitation entirely apart from finances should be undertaken every few years. After all, it is the people and the church waxes.

Many other things were discussed including public relations, church school teachers' meetings and attendance at evening services. The last note of the chapter meeting was one of optimism and challenge. In the Deanery of Halton, much new building is planned, and some are already in the process of being built. It was urged that far-sighted planning should be done in order that the church keep up with the growth of population.

It was suggested that the rectors involved, especially the rectors of Oakville, Burlington, Palermo and Milton, meet with Diocesan officials and experts on the matter to make sure that the proper and best sites were obtained for new churches in the rapidly growing areas of the Deanery.

Mrs. Maxwell provided a wonderful dinner for the clergy with the assistance of a member of the congregation of St. Paul's, Norval. The chapter meeting was considered to be one of the most worthwhile and instructive that has been held recently.

Summer Meetings To Plan for Show St. Alban's Men's Club Musical Show will be postponed until fall; the group has decided. Those interested will continue their meetings during the summer to practice and make further plans.

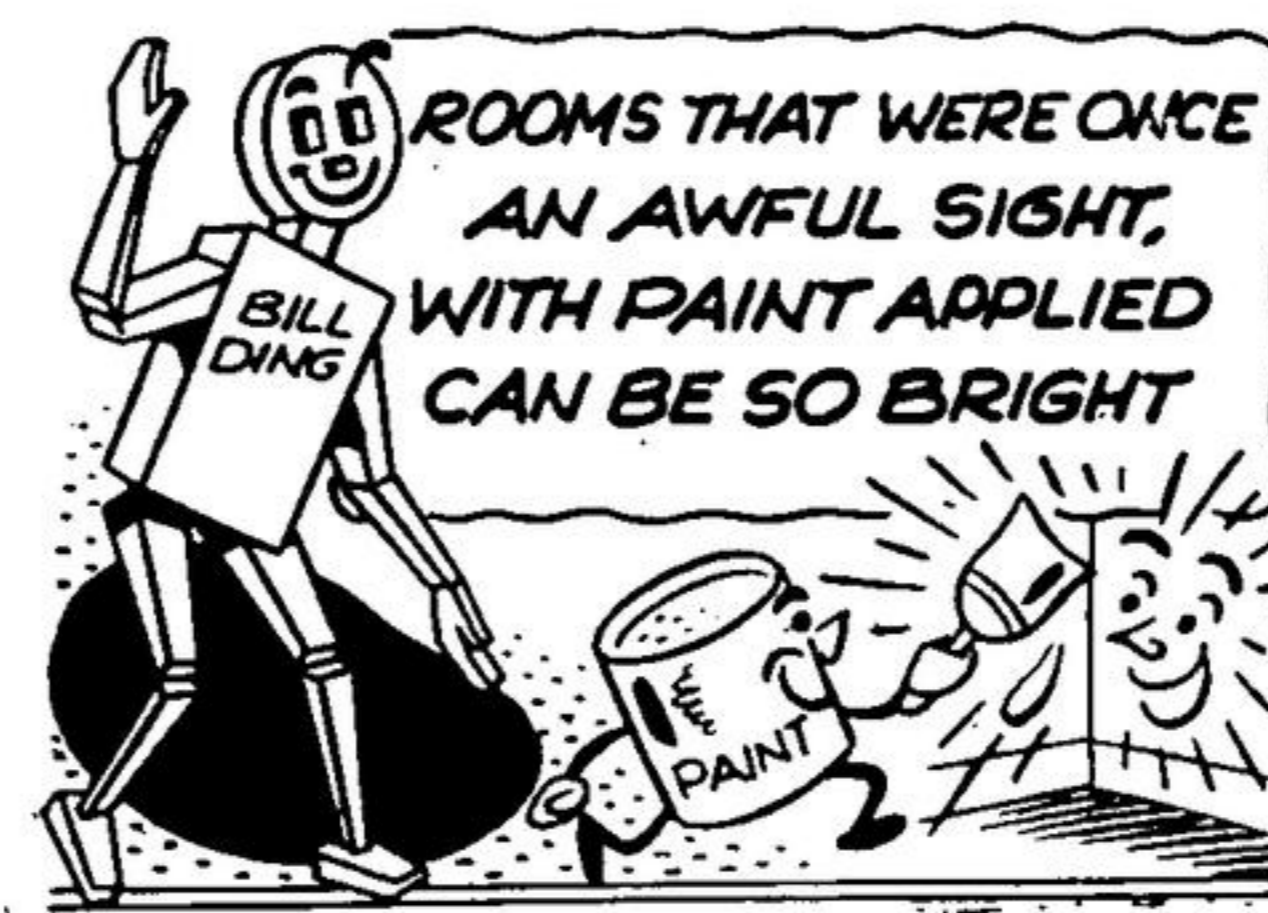
A ballerina length gown of white linen was chosen by the bride, who wore pink carnations.
