## Know Lung Cancer In Early Stages

When cancer of the lung begins it so closely resembles a form of pneumonia, called pneumonitis, that not even the X ray can show the difference. Now, an ingenious indirect method of diagnosis is available.

Terramycin, a broad-range antibiotic, will attack almost all of the germs capable of causing pneumonia, wiping out a true infection. If a cancer is present, however, the antibiotic will not affect it. Thus, if the difficulty does not clear up after a week of intensive antibiotic treatment, it is probably an early cancer.

In its first trials, in a New York hospital, the method enabled Dr. E. Edward Benzer and his co-workers to detect four cancer cases in six patients whose symptoms were otherwise difficult to interpret.

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## Professional Sports, Television Rapped By Y Discussion Group on Youth Friday

A small group representing industry, office workers, ministers and housewives met last Friday evening in Acton Y.M.C.A. for the second discussion of a series on Youth. Speaker for the session was Cliff Sutton who considered "The influence of sport and recreation on youth of today."

He mentioned the differences between sport of the past and present. "Sport has many chances in shaping personality, but there has to be leadership," Mr. Sutton declared. Although there are many objections to the way sporting events are conducted now, it must be admitted there is more leadership of specialists, he said.

There was animated discussion in the groups which were formed after Mr. Sutton's talk. The groups came to the following conclusions:

**Conclusions of Groups**

1. Recreation and sports are separated by the attitude of the participants. Recreation is for enjoyment and sports have the aim of winning.
2. Professionalism, or the paying of players spoils recreation.
3. Passive recreation is a contradiction in terms. True recreation includes participation. "Live" recreation is better than "learned" recreation—such as listening to records.
4. Television was considered detrimental to reading and outdoor play of children. Unfortunately television does too much for us, we should create more of our own recreation using our imagination and talents.
5. Education can play its part.
