"Suitcase Farmers" Problem, Dean Tells

The second annual convention of the Baptist Women's Missionary Society of Ontario and Quebec met at McMaster University in Hamilton May 26, 27 and 28. Members of the Acton Mission Circle journeyed down on Wednesday, May 26 with Mrs. C. Landsborough and Mrs. R. Costerus registering as delegates and Mrs. H. Helwig and Miss Edna Fryer as visitors.

After registration the ladies proceeded to the new Mills Memorial Library where film strips were being shown. The first depicted Sunday school scenes all over the world. The life of Albert Schweizer was also seen and finally two frames from a new set of colored films on the life of Christ prepared for use in Christian Education.

In the afternoon and evening the sessions were held in Convocation Hall. Work of Explorers and Mission Bands was presented by Mrs. Minton Johnson, Toronto. She pointed out that the emphasis has not been on giving but on training in missions. She stressed the need for a closer relationship between Mission Circles and Bands. An excellent demonstration of what can be accomplished in a Mission Band program was presented by the children and their leader from Thorold.

The address of the afternoon session was "The Unfinished Task in India" by Rev. Dr. L. C. Kitchin. He stated that now, more than ever before, is opportunity in India at its peak because of political religious and social upheaval.

Rev. Dr. N. H. Parker, Dean of Divinity at McMaster, spoke in the evening session on Western Missions, describing the history and present situations in the Baptist Home Mission churches in the western provinces of Canada. He stated the greatest problem there as being "suitcase farmers."

So many are only on the farms to seed and harvest their crops and the rest of the time travel or go to larger towns and cities to live. He urged the churches of Ontario and Quebec to give greatly to assist this needy work.
