Soccer Club Wings Out Win Over Galt In Thriller Here

Local soccer fans got a thrill-a-minute Saturday when they saw the home club down Galt by seven goals to six.

It was a hot and hectic game from the first whistle, with play so fast it is understandable that there be mistakes. Galt made the first one, a defensive slip that let Bottomley nip through and put Acton one up in the first five minutes.

Play was even for some time after that, with Galt's goalie well tried with shots from Flax and Sutton while Calder, too, had to be on his toes to keep the ball out of Acton's net.

With about 10 minutes to go a pass from Allen found Bottomley unmarked on the wing; he collected the ball, took it in and scored his second before anyone could reach him. This seemed to sting Galt; they kicked off, held the ball and with a clever move through Leusink scored. A minute later the same player evened the score with a shot that gave Calder no chance at all.

Lead at Half 3-3

Just before the whistle to end the half Bottomley, in a switch play with Allen, got the ball in front of the net made his hat trick and gave Acton a half-time lead of 3-2.

Galt piled the pressure in the second half. The ball seldom moved out of Acton's half. This paid off after 15 minutes when Day, from a scramble in front of the goal, pushed the ball past Jock. Soon after Mackay put Galt in the lead for the first time.

This time it was Acton that was stung. They proceeded to show Galt just how close they could come to scoring without actually putting the ball in the net. After about ten minutes of unceasing barrage, Bottomley got the ball about mid-field, reeled up the wing and slammed one that appeared certain. He heard a groan from the crowd as the ball hit the post and bounced out. However, cheering followed when Allen got the ball on the rebound and made no mistake with his shot.

One minute later he got another. Galt kicked off, Nolan stole the ball from the opposing inside-left, booted it hard up the field into the net. Galt kicked off again and the same thing happened except this time Davies gave the pass—a hat trick for Allen in two minutes, 6-4 for Acton.

The Game After Scramble

Galt's turn again. Drost scored with a free kick from just outside the penalty area, a perfect shot. A scramble in front of Acton's goal and a miskick by Noel and Timberlake tied the game 6-6. Acton kicked off, the forwards moved up the field, Sutton got the ball, centred quickly and Bottomley got there in time to shove it into the net with his fourth goal of the game.

At the whistle, final score: Acton 7, Galt 6.

After the game comments ranged high on the quality and consistency of fast play. Galt is the best team Acton has met so far even though the local team has been defeated by two teams from Kitchener when not at full strength. Acton's next game will be played Saturday against Kitchener City in Kitchener.
