**ESQUEUING TOWNSHIP BY-LAW No. 10-54**

A By-law for prohibiting the use of cabin-trailers, trailer-coaches or other forms of portable dwellings in the Township of Esqueuing.

Whereas it is deemed necessary and expedient to pass a by-law to prohibit the use of cabin-trailers, trailer-coaches and other forms of portable dwellings in the Township of Esqueuing;

And whereas under Paragraph 91A of subsection 1 of section 388 of the Municipal Act Chapter 243 R.S.O. 1950 as amended in 1952, the power is conferred upon the Councils of Local Municipalities, to prohibit the use of such trailers as dwellings or places of human habitation;

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPAL CORP. OF ESQUEUING ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. No person shall use or permit to be used any cabin-trailer, trailer-coach or other form of portable dwelling for the living, sleeping, or eating accommodation of persons within the Municipality of the Township of Esqueuing, for a longer period than 60 days in any period of 10 consecutive months.

2. This By-law shall apply to any cabin-trailer, trailer-coach or other form of portable dwelling within the Township of Esqueuing, whether or not such trailer was used for the living, sleeping or eating accommodation of persons before the passing of this By-law.

3. Any person found guilty of contravening any of the provisions of this By-law shall be liable, upon conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00 for each offense, and each day that a person contravenes this By-law shall be deemed to constitute a separate offense.

4. Nothing in this By-law shall be so construed as to prevent anyone parking a cabin-trailer, trailer-coach or other form of portable dwelling upon his own land and using it as a temporary dwelling while constructing a permanent building which complies with the Building By-laws of the Township of Esqueuing providing such temporary use does not exceed the period of one week.

5. This By-law shall take effect from the day on which it receives its third reading and shall remain in full force and effect until it is amended or rescinded by the Council of the Township of Esqueuing.

Read a first and second time this 7th day of June 1954.

Read a third time and passed this 7th day of June, 1954.
