The demonstrations in Milton were part of the program for the annual convention of the Ontario Volunteer Firemen's Association there. Although the local truck did not reach Milton, the Acton brigade was represented by most members at various times during the three day convention.

Consider 200 Lot Subdivision For 50 Acre Area in Town

Builder's Interest Outlined Tuesday

Representatives of Thomas and Thomas Construction Co. are scheduled to meet members of Council this week following Tuesday night's regular session where it was revealed that the Cooksville farm is interested in a 50 acre property in town with a view to opening a new housing subdivision.

G. W. Goldstraw real estate broker assured Council that while no deal has yet been reached, the Thomas firm was genuinely interested in this certain piece of property and added that a development of the area could mean as many as 200 houses.

However, Mr. Goldstraw continued, the Thomas Company wished to know if the town would not consider a stand alone division of service costs. At present the Council requires a subdivision to pay 50 per cent of all sewers, water mains and roads and all of sidewalks and light standards.

Fire Aid for Erin

After further discussion on the subject it was agreed that Mayor E. Tyler, Reeve J. Stewart and Councillor J. Barrgrave should meet representatives of the firm Wednesday morning.

Prior to this decision, Mr. Goldstraw and his local representative, R. H. Elliott, urged that Acton should not hesitate to take steps to enlarge housing facilities since Mr. Elliott maintained adequate housing often is the motivating consideration by an interested industry.

Council was told earlier in the meeting that no price quotation is yet available on the sheeting proposed for the curling rink roof.

Clerk J. McGeechae reported that following a meeting of the fire committee with representatives of Esquerring, Nassagaweya and Erin Township councils it was agreed to continue with the present fire area arrangement until the end of the year but to answer calls in the southern part of Erin Township now and draft a new agreement.

McColl Wilson was the youngest and last surviving member of the family of Hugh and Christine McColl of the fifth line Esquerring early settlers of the Scotch Block. Her husband, the late James G. Wilson, a teacher in Burlington, was a county road superintendent.

Mrs. Wilson, a teacher in her younger years, was believed to be the oldest living graduate of Toronto Normal School.

A daughter, Mrs. Harrison, four grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren survive.

Entombment in Hamilton Mausoleum followed a private funeral service.

Council accepted this agreement round at the meeting and passed a resolution covering it.

Warren Grove Difficulties

After a progress report on the Warren Grove Sewer installations was read and resolutions passed ordering payment of \$3,745.78 to the contractor and \$3,674.27 to Canadian Johns-Manville for sewer pipe, the latter amount to be subtracted from the contractor's payments as paid to date. Several members criticized the engineering supervision on the job.

Those not satisfied with the type of supervision were getting May. 21. Tyler stated and agreed to a statement from most members present. Stories surrounding the reported case of a youth which resulted in a stoppage of the laying in Warren Grove were circulated as being untrue.

Quoys for help were answered by local police and firemen were called and members of the brigades to the lake with an intent to rescue the boy.

When rescuers arrived the boy was found to be dead.

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
