To Award Prizes For Fair Pictures

Designed to emphasize the importance of annual fall fairs and the part they play in the economy and development of the province, the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies, in conjunction with the Canadian National Exhibition, is sponsoring a colored photography competition featuring the Ontario community fairs.

The competition, which is expected to attract many entries, has been planned with four major objectives in mind. (1) To encourage more attractive staging of exhibits and displays. (2) To create greater pride in well kept buildings and grounds. (3) To arouse keener interest in colored photography as an effective means of publicizing the activities of agricultural societies. (4) To establish a supply of educational material for educational use by the association and member societies.

Prizes to the amount of \$350 will be awarded by the Canadian National Exhibition with the idea of encouraging the smaller fairs of the province.

The competition will be divided into two sections: one division being for class A and class B fairs and the other for smaller fairs. Each entry is to consist of five colored transparencies, two inches by two inches, taken during the 1954 fair. They are to include the entrance to grounds; grandstand or other building; junior or 4-H club exhibit; women's work; commercial feature; display of grain or vegetables; and livestock.

Business, Parades, Sports At Firemen's Convention

The four day convention of the Ontario Firemen's Association opened Friday of last week in Milton and wound up on Monday, following a series of business sessions, parades, a memorial parade, picnic, demonstration of the Halton Mutual Aid and sports events. Attended by 76 delegates from the area, a total of 184 firemen registered including 74 life members.

Friday's events started with registration at 9 a.m. and the opening ceremonies conducted by Rev. E. Orsborn. Mayor Heslop welcomed the delegates and pointed out the dire circumstances people in small towns would be in without the volunteer firemen. He presented a large gold key as the Key to Milton, to the president of the association, E. Cooper. Chief A. E. Clement also expressed the welcome of the Milton Fire Brigade to the delegates.

First delegation to register on Friday was Captain Ernest A. Reedy and Deputy Chief W. Greenwood of Thilketown Fire Brigade with G. Hargrave and Neil Oke were the delegates from the greatest distance, having travelled from Petrolia.

An amateur show on Saturday evening formed part of the entertainment with the carnival, midway and dance providing further attractions.

Parade on Sunday Sunday approximately 80 firemen paraded to the cenotaph in Victoria Park for a brief memorial service conducted by Rev. N. Green. "We are here to do special honor to those who gave their lives in the interest of freedom, peace and power as we know it," Rev. Green declared. "We shall remember them. Their action, devotion and sacrifice cannot and must not be forgotten," he concluded. Newly elected president Keith Balls and Chief A. E. Clement placed a wreath at the cenotaph.

Monday's events were initiated with a display of the Halton Mutual Aid system with eight trucks participating in pump water through seven hose lines from three sources. The hose lines converged at the Main St. bridge.

The Civic Holiday parade included over 350 firemen and five bands, trucks and floats. Heading the parade was the No. 2 Milton truck followed by a demonstration hook and ladder and the Lorne Scots Pipe Band with the Milton Fire Brigade. The original fire truck concluded the Milton section of the parade that originated at the public school grounds and paraded to the Agricultural grounds.

Convention Fires In Milton in 1904 On hand for the demonstration of the Halton Mutual Aid on Monday morning was George Houston, Milton, who recalled the convention of 1904 in Milton and remarked "it was nothing like this." Chattering about his 81 years' service with the brigade from 1892, he remembered that two nights of the convention kept the local brigade pretty busy because there were so many fires originating with enterprising delegates. Of the brigade at that time, Mr. Houston thought only Jack Armstrong and Sam Brush are still living. "Free exercise of religion" was promised Canadians in the treaty which in 1763 ended the wars between the British and the French
