treated. This year, all wheat in order to be eligible for registration, must have a clean reading for Dwarf Bunt, both in field inspection and in a microscopic test of the sample. To date there is no known treatment for Dwarf Bunt-furthermore. once introduced into a field, the organism is carried over in the soil. As yet, we have not heard of any Dwarf Bunt being found in

Halton. In addition to Dwarf Bunt, there are the other two types of smut. namely, Loose Smut and Stinking Smut or Bunt. All farmers are. of course. familiar with the latter type, namely Stinking Smut or Bunt, which in the days of inside threshing, on occasions, made the

job of threshing a real headache. Fortunately the treatment with one of the mercuric dusts or liquids will control this and no one should sow seed without treatment. In the case of loose smut, there is a hot water treatment but this is not very practical and consequently the solution is to sow seed free of the

Fortunately the newer varieties.
