Veteran Two Wars W. J. Gould Dies

One of Acton's well-known citizens and a veteran of two wars, William J. Gould, passed away suddenly on Thursday afternoon at his home on Bower Ave. He had been in declining health for some time but was about as usual until the time of his death on Thursday. Our first vivid memory of Gunner Gould was his triumphant return from the South African War where his companion, Stanley Moore, had lost his life. It was a day that stands out in our memories. In the first World War he again enlisted and served overseas. He was the first president of Acton Branch of the Canadian Legion and instrumental in forming the branch here. A native of York county near Brampton, he spent his boyhood days with the family in Hanover, but for over 50 years Acton has been his home. For many years he was an employee of Beardmore and Co. He was an ardent lover of sports and in earlier years Acton teams had no more loyal supporter than Billy Gould. The realm of sport in which he himself excelled was on the bowling green and throughout the province he was fondly known to all devotees of this game. Shuffleboard has been enjoyed by him in recent weeks as he continued participating in sports. His wife, the former Margaret Campbell, predeceased him years ago and he leaves a stepdaughter, Miss Robena Clark, Acton; a stepson, Boyd Clark of Toronto, a sister, Miss Agnes J. Gould of Pittsburgh, Penn. and step granddaughter, Mrs. J. Adams (Donna), A. sister, Dr. Margaret A. Gould, predeceased him. To all of these warm sympathy of friends in this home community goes in their bereavement. The funeral on Saturday afternoon at the Victor Rumley and Son Funeral Home, was largely attended by friends from Acton and out of town. Service was conducted by his minister, Rev. R. H. Armstrong of Knox Presbyterian church and interment was in Fairview cemetery. Members of the Canadian Legion followed the cortege in marching order and paid tribute to a fallen comrade with the graveside service and deposited poppies on the flag-draped casket. Last Post was sounded by Bandsman Elmer J. Smith. Pallbearers were Legionnaires Fred Wright, J. M. McDonald, George Musselle and Tom Bennett, H. R. Gilmour and Donald Gilmour.
