Paper Sculpture Shells on Display

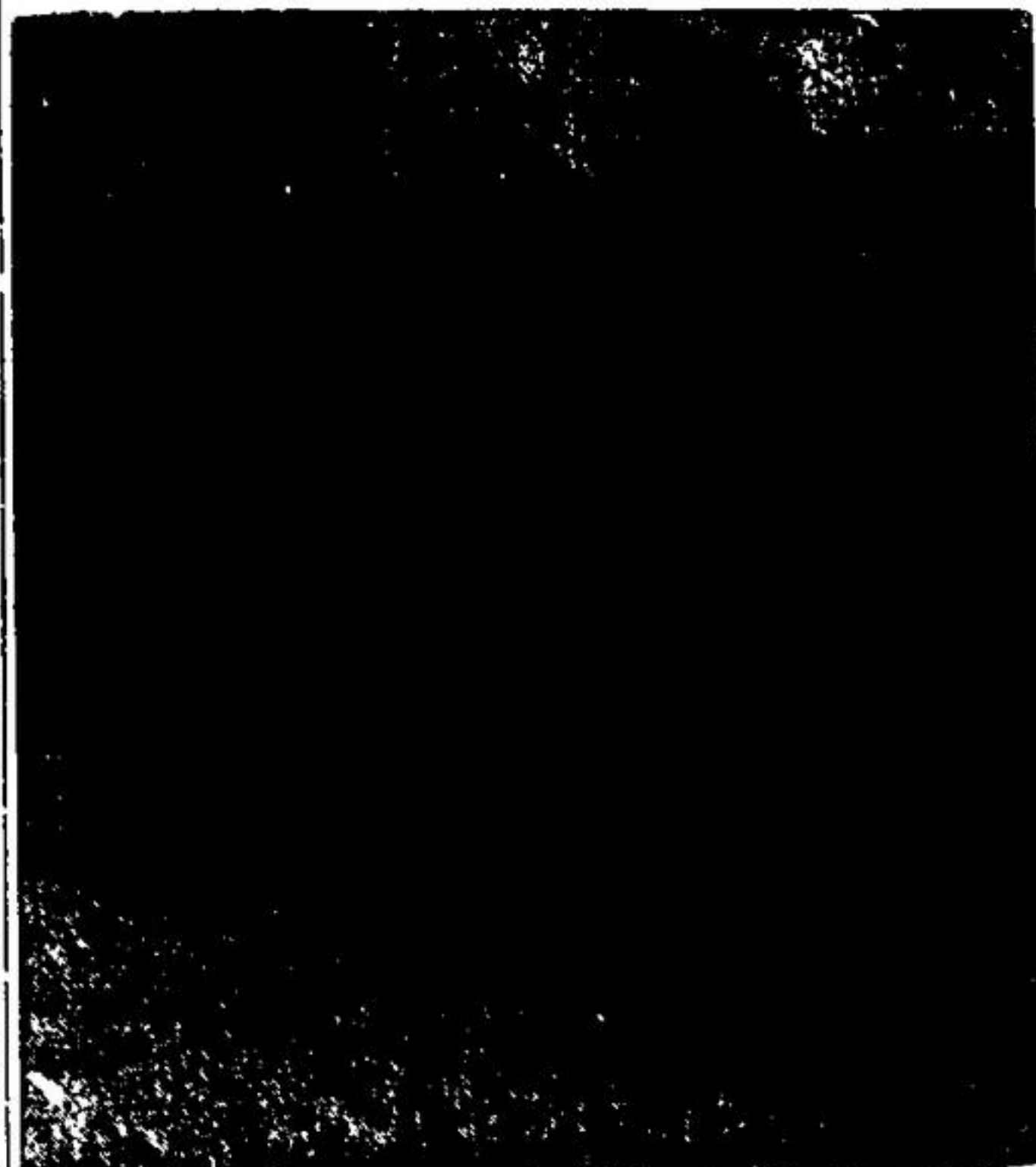

Arrest D. Stewart AWOL From Army

Donald Stewart, 23, of R.R. 1, Puslinch, was arrested late Thursday night by two members of the Ontario Provincial Police, Guelph detachment, and was charged with desertion from the Canadian Army.

He was released on \$2,000 bail after he had been charged with giving police false information in connection with the death of George Hardie on Sunday, August 22.

Donald Stewart was reported to

have gone absent without leave on June 2. He was a member of the 1st Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment stationed in London. He had been struck off strength when he went AWOL and classed as a deserter.

Beverly Stewart, 18-year-old brother of Donald, was charged with motor manslaughter in connection with the same accident. He was released on \$5,000 bail Thursday, along with his brother.

The preliminary hearing was set for September 3 by Magistrate Watt.

Donald Stewart has been a member of the Canadian Army for the past two years.
