Born in Acton, youngest son of the late John Warren and Helen McDonald, Dr. Cameron Alexander Warren, M.D. Ph.D., passed away suddenly on Sunday, August 22 at his home, 150 St. Clair Ave., Toronto.

He graduated from the University of Toronto and established his practice on "The Hill" in Toronto, where he always lived. During the First World War he was on Headquarters Staff for a period, then in command of the 16th Field Ambulance in Vladivostok, retiring with the rank of Colonel. Active in many fields, he was on the staff of the Western Hospital.

He was a past president of the Academy of Medicine, the Aesculapian Society and the Ontario Health Officers' Association. He was the M.O.H. of York Township for many years but retired in 1949. Dr. Warren was a member of Toronto - Antiquity Chapter and York Lodge A.F. and A.M. and the Granite Club. He attended St. Clair Ave. Baptist Church.

He leaves his wife, the former Mary L. Morin, as well as several nephews and nieces. Mrs. John Wood of Acton is a niece and Mr. and Mrs. Wood attended the funeral last week.
