SCHEDULE "A"

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Essex in the County of Halton, and being composed of parts of Lots Numbers Twenty-five (25), Twenty-six (26), Twenty-seven (27), Twenty-eight (28) and Twenty-nine (29) in Concession III, and parts of Lots Numbers Twenty-seven (27), Twenty-eight (28) and Twenty-nine (29) in Concession IV, in the said Township, more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCING at the Easterly angle of the present boundaries of the Corporation of the Town of Acton, said angle being in the Easterly angle of the lands annexed to the Corporation of the Town of Acton, described in "Secondly" parcel in Registered Instrument No. 117899 in Book G-2 for said Township;

THENCE following the present boundaries: Southwesterly, Northwesterly, Westerly, Southwesterly, Southeastery and Southwesterly to the Northeastery limit of Highway No. 25, as widened and shown on Highway Land Plan No. 421;

THENCE Southeastery along the said last mentioned limit to its intersection with the Southeastery limit of the West Half of Lot No. 26 in Concession III;

THENCE Northeastery along the said Southeastery limit of the said West Half of Lot No. 26 to the Easterly angle thereof;

THENCE Southeastery along the Southwesterly limit of the East Half of Lot No. 25, Concession III, to the Southerly angle of the lands of the Town of Acton, described in Registered Instrument No. 11846 in Book C-2;

THENCE Northeastery along the said Southeastery limit of the said lands of the Town of Acton Three Hundred (300) feet to the most Easterly angle thereof;

THENCE Northwesterly along the Northeastery limit of the said last mentioned lands to the Northery angle thereof;

THENCE Northeastery along the Southeastery limit of the East Half of Lot No. 26, in Concession III, to the Easterly angle thereof;

THENCE Northwesterly along the Northeastery limit of the said East Half of Lot No. 26 to the Northery angle thereof;

THENCE Northeastery to the Southerly angle of the West Half of Lot No. 27 in Concession IV;

THENCE continuing Northwesterly along the said Southeastery limit of the said West Half of Lot No. 27 to the Easterly angle thereof;

THENCE Northwesterly along the Southeastery limit of the said West Half of Lot No. 27 to the Northery angle thereof;

THENCE Northwesterly to the Easterly angle of the West Half of the West Half of Lot No. 28, in Concession IV;

THENCE Northwesterly along the Northeastery limit of the said West Half of the West Half of Lot No. 28 to the Northery angle thereof;

THENCE Southwesterly along the Northwesterly limit of the said West Half of Lot No. 28 to a point in the said limit distant Two Hundred (200) feet, measured Northwesterly from the Southwesterly limit of the West Half of Lot No. 28 in said Concession IV and at right angles thereto;

THENCE Northwesterly parallel to the said Southwesterly limit of said West Half of Lot No. 28, in Concession IV, Seven Hundred and Seventy-one and four-tenths (771.4) feet;

THENCE Southwesterly parallel to the Southeastery limit of the West Half of Lot No. 29 to the Northwesterly limit of the East Half of Lot No. 29 in Concession III;

THENCE Southwesterly in a straight line to a point in the production Northwesterly of the Northeastery limit of Registered Plan No. 370 for the Town of Acton, distant Thirty-six (36) feet measured Northwesterly along the said production from the Northery angle of said Registered Plan No. 370;

THENCE Southwesterly parallel to the Southeastery limit of the East Half of Lot No. 29 in Concession III to the Southwesterly limit of the said East Half of Lot No. 29;

We quote rule five of the C.B.A.: The pit shall be not less than 10 inches in depth when alley is originally constructed and at no time shall said pit be less than nine and a half inches in depth, measuring from the top of the pit mat or cushion to the alley surface and shall be not less than two and a half feet in width from the alley edge to the surface of the rear swinging cushion and a board not to exceed two inches in thickness may be attached to the rear of the alley bed.
