### Acton High School News

It is the story of the life of Elizabeth Barrett, a popular poetess of a century or so ago, and Robert Browning, the well known poet whom she married.

Friday afternoon, September 17, grade 13 and Mr. Hansen motored to Guelph to attend the opening of General Electric plant. At 2 p.m. the opening ceremonies were conducted. The Hon. C. D. Howe presided at a button lifting off a four million volt charge which signified the official opening of the plant. After a tour of the whole plant, lunch was served in the cafeteria. It was an interesting afternoon for all.

Mr. M. M. Pasty, our new teacher from Sudbury, arrived for classes on Monday, September 20. He is grade 11's form teacher and teaches science, social studies, English and guidance in grades nine and 10. We wish him the best of luck in Acton.

Tuesday morning of last week, the hydro converter stopped before school and stayed that way until noon. The classes scheduled for the office were moved to the teachers' rooms where there was more light. The hydro was again off on Wednesday but was fixed before classes began.

### Zoning By-laws Held Up

Planning Board vice-chairman T. Jones told the Board under questioning that a zoning by-law has been held up pending outcome of the annexation proposal. He suggested the trend of residential building was toward the areas east and west of the third line.

During the questioning of Georgetown assessor, A. Gibbon, chairman urged the council to endeavor to check inquiries from ranging too far afield.

Public School Board chairman T. Watson replied to Mr. Lucas' queries there were 23 pupils attending Acton Public School whose place of residence is in the proposed annexation area. Counselor Dale drew out from Mr. Watson, in cross examination that the additional cost to the board for these pupils was negligible.

R. N. Brown, owner of a large area of property on the eastern edge which is in the land bid boundaries, stated to Counselor Lucas he received a certain aspect of the annexation favorably but said a 200 foot strip to the north of his land boundaries he wished to see retained in the township. Otherwise, he was favorable to the town annexing a 50 acre block of his property just north of the highway.

### Town Complete Case

R. Thompson testified briefly that as the lessee of a commercial piece of property just outside town he was anxious to see annexation. Six other town witnesses who live just east of Acton's limits testified they were anxious, for various reasons, to see annexation achieved. They were H. Cook, I. Duby, G. McKeown, H. Shortill, D. Timmings and W. J. Gordon.

Clerk McGeachie was again asked to take the witness stand and was briefly questioned on assessment figures over the recent year. Two other witnesses, chief S. Terrant and local police chief R. Mason, were also called to testify regarding town and area protection in future protection on property.

After 16 minutes testimony the council has a total of 24 separate testimonies over the period. This included the two witnesses called by Georgetown, a total of 315 pm. Wednesday.

Counselor McMillan said the case has been adjourned but had been some adj. during the previous testimony and reasons for their desire to be annexed would be dealt with in argument.

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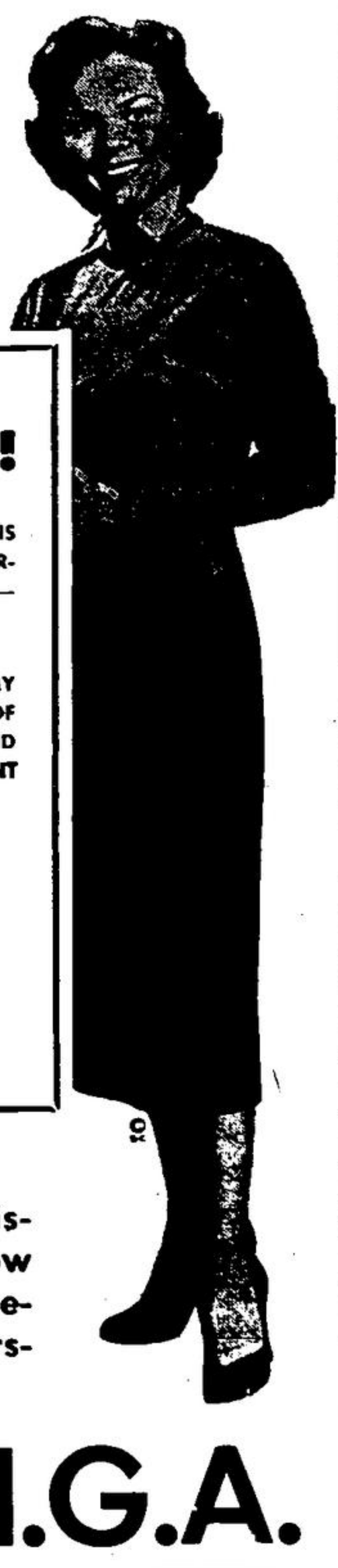
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
