payments on well points cost only on days worked, notwithstanding working days disrupted by rain.
A motion to introduce a by-law to authorize the addendum to the contract was called and passed. Following this the by-law was read and passed unanimously.
Councillor Footitt remarked that in doing this the town was not conceding it broke the contract in the first place but was acting to get the job done.
Want Streets Levelled
Councillors Waick and Hargrave expressed concern that Wallace St. should be levelled and put into respectable shape before the sewer job is finished. Mr. Schultz, remarking the road seemed in no worse shape than when he started the job, replied he would nevertheless have it graded.
"To prevent further disagreement," Mr. Hyde stated, "I believe we'll issue progress reports every two weeks, regardless of extent of work done."
Concluding the conference, Mr. Schultz indicated if the well points could be rented immediately, and he believed they could, the equipment would be installed by about mid-week and after necessary running time had elapsed, work should be resumed by next week.
Withdraws Taxi License
Before the sewer disagreement exhausted, which consumed about two-thirds of Monday's four hour council session, the tender of Bilton and Perry Limited for town hall plumbing changes was accepted at a price of \$335.
Clerk McGeachie informed members that a recent application for another taxi license in town has been withdrawn. He also submitted for review the plan of subdivision on the recently sold Braida property and submitted a subdivision questionnaire from the Department of Planning and Development.
Council accepted an account for an indigent patient and refused to accept another similar account on the basis the indigent in question is now employed in this town.
The city of Hamilton informed the town of zoning particulars as affecting the lot owned by this municipality in that city.
Note Routine Reports
Council recognized a cheque from the H.E.P.C. for a substation property purchase on Willow St. Council also noted a letter from the town of Milton, thanking Acton for use of local police officers during Milton fair.
The clerk was asked to have the town solicitor advise Baxter Laboratories Ltd. that if their company was not satisfied with conditions of sale on a certain piece of property, the town would not proceed.
The Guelph Daily Mercury requested, and was granted, permission to put up newspaper vending boxes in this town.
A report from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, a notice of convention from the Good Roads Association and a letter regarding progress of natural gas were noted and filed.
Councillor A. Irwin and deputy-reeve R. Thompson drew attention to several trees and stumps in town in need of removal.
Water Seepage Complaint
To a complaint of water seepage into a downtown building, members agreed to investigate to ascertain responsibility. From this consideration arose talk on suspicion that some downtown ratepayers are unlawfully diverting rain flow into the municipal sanitary system. This practice, if prevalent, was sharply condemned.
At the close of the meeting Mayor Tyler hinted there is a good possibility of another subdivision developing in this town. Deputy-reeve Thompson wondered if perhaps caution should be applied now in more subdivision growth.
