

## Give Permission For Gas Pipe Line

Permission to run its gas pipe line under all north-south township roads was given the Western Pipe Lines by a by-law passed by Trafalgar township council at a recent meeting. Construction of the line is now in progress. The by-law also authorizes the sale to the firm of an easement on the township-owned lot on the Ninth Line, now used as a garbage dump, at a price of \$2,500. L. W. Finch, president of Trustee Corporation (Canada) Ltd., addressed council at some length, requesting an amendment to building by-law clause which provides that garages or car-ports must be at least six feet from the limits of a 60-foot lot. He was advised to take the matter up with planning consultant Mr. Finch's firm has started work on a housing sub-division on the Sixth Line south of the Upper Middle Road, and expects to have 70 or 80 houses up by the end of the year.
