Find True Canada Away From Cities

Toronto Ont. (CP)—If you want to get the true picture of Canada to learn the true Canadian spirit, you have got to get outside its cities and move around say travellers Henry Beissel, bearded German-born playwright and author and Isabel his Spanish-born wife.

The Beissels base their claim on a recent three-month tour that covered 15,000 miles in Canada.

They arrived back in Toronto, where they have been living for the past three years with a trunkful of notes, a 70,000 word diary and thousands of feet of film.

They found that in cities, people are preoccupied with industrial and commercial growth and tend toward coldness. People they met outside are warm and hospitable, they said.

Friendly Hosts

"One of our greatest experiences was this hospitality and friendliness of people, so many of whom insisted on us coming into their homes for dinner for example," Mr. Beissel said.

"People in Canada take you for what you are. That's different from Europe. And in that way, perhaps the sort of state we hope to have in the world is already accomplished here."

Backing for their trip came from businessmen who supplied them with a car and equipment including parkas and lamps. The CBC supplied Mr. Beissel with several thousand feet of film to shoot scenes for television. The CBC plans to use the film in a series of programs showing Canadian children how other children live.

They talked to trappers and prospectors, millionaires who were once penniless, miners, cowboys and city dwellers, Eskimos and Indians.

Passing through Northern Ontario, they were caught in a forest fire. A ranger got them out. They had to be towed through a mile of mud on the Trans-Canada highway in Saskatchewan. Flying with a bush pilot to drop supplies to a survey party, they hit an air pocket and the plane town of 30,000 half a century ago, now virtually a ghost town.
