Saturday morning, however, cellars under the residences of W. Roberts and C. K. Browne, both of Main St. N., adjacent to the swollen creek, had to be pumped out by firemen.

Four feet of water in the Brown cellar caused damage to stored soft drinks and confectionery. In Roberts home, water rose six feet in the cellar, ruining clothing, bedding and a chesterfield suite. Damage here was estimated at over \$2,000.
