Accident Victim Buried October 20

Ivan Norman Huffman, who was killed in an automobile accident in Georgetown on October 17, lived in Acton from 1936 until 1939. He was born in Georgetown in 1930, and returned to that town with his family in 1939. His home was on Main St., Georgetown.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Huffman, brothers William, Toronto, Keith, Toronto, John Robert, St. Catharines and a sister Mrs. Gibson (Mary Lou Huffman) of St. Catharines.

He attended Acton public school and then Georgetown public and high schools. He was employed as a group leader on jet blade production aircraft.

An active bowler in the Georgetown Bowling leagues, he was also wingman on O.H.A. juvenile, junior and intermediate hockey teams, and a catcher on the O.B.A. juvenile and intermediate baseball teams.

Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service at the McClure funeral home in Georgetown on October 20. Pallbearers were Jack Hamilton, Hugh Wylie, William Carey, William Hewitt, Glen Elliot and Ross Dillon, all of Georgetown. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

James Kirkwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Kirkwood of Ballinafad, received his early education at the Blue Mountain Public School and the Georgetown High School. He graduated from Victoria College, Toronto in June of this year and is now enrolled in his first year Theological Course at Emmanuel College, Toronto. During his senior year at Victoria he acted as Athletic Director for the University and is now active in all sports activities for Emmanuel College.

This summer he served as Student Minister on the Belmont Lake Pastoral charge in the Peterborough Presbytery with preaching points at Vittoria, Rush Lake, and South Point.

During their College courses both men will serve on Mission fields under the Home Mission Board or may take up work in some regular charge where there is a shortage of a minister.
