

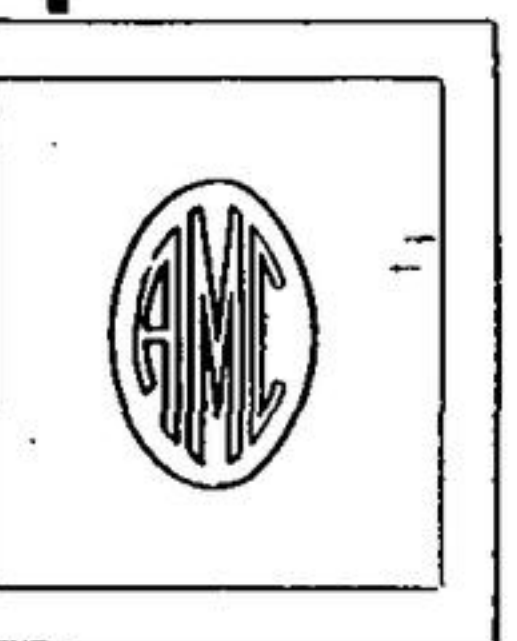

National Secretary Editor at Pre-Test

Monday evening, November 8, Bannockburn farm forum met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Davidson with 18 members and guests present. After the farm forum radio program, general business was conducted. Mrs. Davidson was elected president. Mrs. C. Storey secretary and Mrs. W. J. McDonald assistant secretary for the season.

Mr. and Mrs. Davidson introduced Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Griesboch and Miss MacLeod to those present. Mr. Griesboch is the national farm forum secretary and Miss MacLeod the new editor of Farm Forum Guide in place of the usual forum discussion. Miss MacLeod read the questionnaire on a December topic, Getting Started. Mr. Griesboch divided the group into groups of five, each group discussed two questions. To what sources do young farmers in your area look for credit when they are establishing their own farms? How can a young farmer avoid unduly heavy investments when he is getting started?

From the discussions and group findings, Miss MacLeod observed whether the questionnaire is clear or ambiguous, whether the discussion is lively or dull. She can then revise the questions if necessary.

Mr. Griesboch told the members that junior farmers should be asked to join the forums. Young folks are needed to help strengthen the forums. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the pre-testing and felt it was an honor to have the national secretary and his wife, and the editor of the Farm Forum Guide present. They have promised to come back in the near future when the group hopes to have other forums present.
