Annexation Hearings Are Over, Case to Argument (Continued from Page One)

Dale's questions on debtore debt, school area and fire area, costs and how loss of levy by annexation would affect tax revenue. He was briefly questioned, in turn, by Mr. Lucas. No more witnesses were called by the township and as Mr. Dale moved to request inspection of the lands involved by the board representatives, W. J. Moore and E. J. Schonker, Mr. Lucas rose to recall Mayor E. Tyler. Short Dispute Arises Here a short dispute passed between the two councils on the point of propriety in submission for review of the claim there are 196 acres of vacant land in Acton. The difference chiefly involved Acton assessor G. Musselle, an earlier witness, and circumstances which preceded his testimony. Mr. Tyler ultimately, was questioned by Mr. Lucas on the nature of the vacant lands and why most of it was unavailable for building.

Two witnesses were then called by P. McWilliams who was primarily acting for a private group of property owners west of Acton and desirous of annexation. Mrs. J. Jany described lands formerly in her possession and now in process of sale to a Hamilton firm of subdividers, Fraleigh Construction Co. Following Mrs. Jany, R. Jeffery, a shareholder in the firm, outlined the development intentions for the Jany property and emphasized that to complete the plans for subdivision it was necessary to have the part outside Acton annexed. He further stated the town was agreeable to supplying services and viewed annexation of this area favorably. (This area was included in the town's original annexation but was withdrawn under Municipal Act limitations since revised.) Recalls Original Bid At this point Mr. Dale conceded this property when it is applied for annexation. The presiding officer, Mr. Moore, injected the board has the pleasure of discretion on consideration of this property out of these hearings. Acton council Lucas stood to recall the town's original annexation application and its bounds. He noted the reasons for the change in the proposal earlier this year, but allowed that the town, in a long-range view, was still receptive to annexation of the lands bounded under the original 1897-accr. bid. The town's favor to this larger area was strengthened, he continued, by the evidence of anxiousness on the part of Mr. McWilliams' clients and the Hamilton subdividers to be brought into the municipality. Defending the township's stand against needless or additional annexation of Esqueping lands, Mr. Dale reiterated his client would not block any bona fide housing developments but was set against unnecessary acquisition of the township's present properties.
