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#### 407 Forum's Hold First Discussion

The development of neighborliness and of a better informed community are the two most important features of successful farm forums. This was the opinion of the great majority of the 407 forums which met throughout Ontario on November 5 or the first of their weekly discussions during the 1964-55 reason. Topic for the opening night was "Farm forum in the community," and the groups were tackling the job of assessing the value of the forum in their community.

The Baltic's Corner forum in Glengarry county summarized the feelings of many groups when they said. "Neighborliness and sociability was considered to be the most striking feature of our forum. The educational value of a forum cannot be overestimated. We learn to of other people."


