For the third consecutive year the Rosafe herd of Dr. Hector L. Astengo of Brampton took the Holstein Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor awards at the Royal Winter Fair, Roy Ormiston, Brooklin, Ontario showed the Grand Champion female and Pabst Farms, Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, the Grand Champion bull. The 232 Holsteins shown were from 100 exhibitors from P.E.I., Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Wisconsin.

Runner-up for Premier Exhibitor was J. M. Fraser, Streetsville, Ont. who was also just used out by Pabst Farms is runner-up for Premier Breeder.

Reserve Grand went to Rosafe's winning four year old in milk, Rosafe Shamrock Top. Carrying twenty of score she 'oo is a clean-cut hairy animal. An oddity here is that while Dr. Astengo's ambition of showing a Royal Grand Champion still eludes him, both Ormiston's Grand Champion and his own Reserve Grand Champion are daughters of the famous Rosafe cow, A.B.C. Reflection Sovereign. Progeny of this bull headed both the Senior and Junior get-off classes for Astengo and in fact supplied most of his prize winners.

Despite the overall strength of the Rosafe cattle, that enabled them to win every group class, the competition was so keen that Rosafe took only one first in the individual classes. Pabst Farms had three firsts and Piccard and Clark, Acme, Alberta, two firsts. The latter were a threat throughout the entire show and were strong contenders for Premier Exhibitor.

It was to the Junior Champion bull, however, that Judge Swartz went for his Reserve Grand Champion. This was the first prize Senior bull calf, Houckhoime Hope Supreme, shown by J. E. Houck, Brampton.
