Someone has complained about the amount of talk that goes on at the United Nations. But talk is a lot cheaper and safer than war, a points out The Financial Post.

A hundred years ago in the Crimean War it cost \$700 for every British soldier landed in Russia and \$175 for every 10-inch shell fired at Sebastopol.

Sixty years later in the First World War those figures looked like chicken feed. Some of the bigger shells fired then and at targets of far less significance than Sebastopol cost the taxpayers thousands of dollars and the direct cost of the four-year conflict for Canada alone is now estimated at \$1,698,958,569.

But that again turned out to be almost trivial when the bills were added up for the Second World War.
