Boar's Head Feast On Christmas Day

Some 500 years ago, so the story goes, an Oxford University student was studying Aristotle while taking a walk, when he was attacked by a wild boar. He calmly despatched the brute by thrusting the volume down its throat. His feat is commemorated annually at Queen's College by the Boar's Head Feast on Christmas Day.

Although the 90 pound specimen under whose weight two attendants used to stagger is today replaced by a paper mache model, the spirit of the ceremony remains unchanged. As the choir sings the last notes of a traditional carol, the head is placed on the table of the Provost, the Principal of the College. The Provost then presents the ornaments and embellishments one by one to the choir boys and visitors, the solo singer receiving the orange.

Carving Made Easy With Expert Rules

Here are some hints well worth saving for the carver to read over while the Christmas bird is being basted.

If carving the Christmas turkey is the only dismal spot in an otherwise joyous holiday—take heart! It isn't as difficult as it may seem.

Naturally you must have a good sharp carving knife! The job will prove easier if you stand up to carve and always carve the side of the turkey that's away from you. If the carver is right-handed, place the legs of the bird to the right; if left-handed, to the left.

First, remove a leg by holding the drumstick firmly with the thumb and forefinger. Cut through neck and forth and sever the joint. Press leg away from the body with the flat side of the knife, then cut remaining skin on the back. Place leg on a service plate.

Disjoint drumstick and thigh by holding the leg at almost right angles to the plate and cutting through meat to the bone. Hold thigh with knife and press down on drumstick until bone snaps.

Slice leg meat by holding drumstick perpendicular and cut down, turning the leg to get uniform slices. To slice thigh meat, straddle the bone with fork and cut meat in lengthwise strips.

Next, remove the wing by inserting knife at right angles to breast about 1 1/2 inches above wing and cutting straight down through wing joint.

To slice white meat, insert knife in rib section on opposite side. Hold knife parallel to breast and cut with a sawing motion. Start first slice just above place where wing was removed and cut slices about 3/4 thick.

Cut skin away from cavity to facilitate removal of dressing. In serving, give each person a slice of white and dark meat and a portion of dressing.
