Minimum Prices For Seed Oats, Barley

A recent anhnouncement by the Seed Marketing and Publicity Committee of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association suggests the following minimum prices for seed oats and barley for the 1955 seeding:

Grade-\$1.75 per bus.

Grade-\$2.50 per bus. tail sales of treated seed, bags included, at local shipping points.

Losses to seed grain by rust and rain have been heavy this year over a wide area of the province, particularly in Eastern and Northern Ontario, as well as in Western Canada and the U.S. Supplies are reported as not being too plentiful, and consequently those in this county who will be in need of seed, would be well advised to secure their requirements early in the sea-


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
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
