A Roy Coulter, Halton Federation secretary, sent in the following report from Halton: "Progress has been achieved during 1934, evident in the fact that for the first time Halton County Federation of Agriculture has met its financial obligation to the Ontario Federation of Agriculture."

"Township interest has been active, each sponsoring a church service and giving help to the calfhood vaccination program; township committees gave assistance in the annual Field Day of Sports for rural school children. Full co-operation of the teachers made it more successful than usual."

"The Folk School was reported to be the best yet with record attendance-at-the-community night with the local Farm Forum group as hosts. Farm Forum interest is being maintained and the groups have assisted in many ways to make other rural organizations function successfully."

"The Halton Community Centre, a federation-sponsored project has taken a step toward establishing a County Rural Museum; the oldest school in Nelson Township has been purchased for this purpose."

"The Halton Co-operative Medical Services is making steady progress, the membership now standing at 1,050 with a coverage of 2,585 persons."

"At the present time the Wheat Harvesting Scheme is under consideration."
