**St. Alban's Rector
Inducted Thursday**

On Thursday, March 10, at 8 p.m., a service of induction was held in St. Alban's Anglican church, Acton. At this service the Rev. Evan H. Jones was inducted by the Archdeacon of Halton and Wellington, the Venerable W. G. O. Thompson.

The new Rector was inducted under a Mandate from the Bishop, the Right Reverend Walter E. Bagnall, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara, and this Mandate of Induction was read to the congregation at the beginning of the service. The Rector read the usual Declarations and Oaths and the Licence was read by the Reverend Ralph Porritt and was delivered to the new Rector by the Archdeacon.

The keys of St. Alban's Church, Acton and St. John's church, Rockwood, were then presented to the new Rector by the Churchwardens, William Denny and L. A. Duby of Acton and Lorne Linfoot and John Lloyd of Rockwood. The keys were received by the new Rector in accordance with ancient ritual.

The salutation was pronounced by the Archdeacon. The Archdeacon and the Churchwardens conducted the new Rector to the Font, the Prayer Desk, the Lectern, the Altar, and the appointed admissions were read.

The special preacher for the occasion was the Reverend Canon S. A. Kirk, L.Th., the Rector of St. George's Church, Guelph. Special music was rendered by the St. Alban's senior choir, under the direction of Mrs. F. G. Oakes, organist and choir mistress. The council would not agree to selling the building at the figure suggested in view of the fact that replacement insurance was carried for \$250,000 at present.

F. S. Pappalardo, Deane School Board, pointed out that there was evidence the Public School population would be doubled in the next few years.

The Public School Board retired while the matter was discussed by each board separately.

The High School Board after considerable deliberation: "That this Board agrees to sell the present Milton High School to the Milton Public School Board for the sum of \$125,000 with possession to be given when new accommodation is available for High School students, subject to the approval of all municipalities in the North Halton High School District, with arrangements to be made between the Boards for High School use of shop and home economics for a period not to exceed ten years."

The Board pointed out this price was arrived at after having a valuation set on the building and was below the valuation figure.

Mr. Ledwith thanked the High School Board for their attendance at the meeting and their consideration of the matter.

After consideration of the proposal by the Public School Board it was reported that the offer had not been accepted and the Public School Board proposed to acquire a new site on which to erect a new Public School building in Milton.
