CONFERENCE PRES. GUEST SPEAKER AT MEETING OF HALTON PRESBYTERY

Dr. Waldemar Williams, M.A., president of Hamilton Conference, visited the March meeting of the Halton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada in Bethel United church on the Hornby pastoral charge, Rev. J. W. Stewart, chairman, presided.

The Evangelism and Social Service Committee reported that Halton Presbytery was uniting with the Hamilton Presbytery in September at Five Oaks Training camp at Paris. All ministers and interested church leaders are invited to a special mission retreat.

In September at St. John's United church, Oakville, a special re-consecration mission retreat is being planned for all elders, stewards, executives of women's organizations, Christian Education and Y.P.U. groups.

Mrs. Brownridge, president of Halton Presbytery W.M.S., gave an interesting 26th annual missionary report, stating there were 1,116 members with 45 senior societies and 235 life members. Mrs. Velma Norris, president for Halton Presbytery W.A. Societies, reported 26 active groups with 36 life members.

Dr. George Little, Lansing, served the church for 32 years in Christian Education, spoke, emphasizing the United Church Observer Evening Family Plan. Dr. Little said that half the families of the United church in Halton Presbytery have enrolled for the Observer and that one-third of the active families throughout Canada have expressed their desire for the Observer.

In outlining the importance of the great paper, Dr. Little stated it was like a pastoral call to each family of the church. Its publication brings recruits for the ministry, it has helped the church to raise 15 millions in the last year and in all it has undergirded the great work of the church.

The Observer is edited at the Publishing House, which was founded 125 years ago by Egerton Ryerson and which turned over four months ago to publication, last year. Dr. Little paid great tribute to the late Dr. Wilson for his fine contribution to the United Church Observer and to the newly elected editor, Rev. A. C. Forest of First United of Port Credit.

President of Hamilton Conference, Rev. W. Williams, M.A., was the special guest. He said he had served the church for 47 years in continuous preaching, 17 years in Westdale, Hamilton. He had only missed two Sundays in the pulpit, 38 years ago. He said he belongs to an expanding church which possesses great vision in all phases, new churches, educational buildings, etc. This is a great day and age to move forward in all workings of the church.

C. G. Riddell of Milton was returned as president of the Ontario Baseball Association at the 38th annual convention held in Cobourg March 18 and 19, and Pete McMullen was elected second vice-president.

The meeting, which was held in Stewarttown Hall, opened with a sing song led by C. Early with Mrs. Stanley May at the piano. Mrs. Cromar added much to the program with humorous readings. T. Bradley, weed inspector for Halton county, showed pictures of some of the more noxious weeds and explained some methods being used to control them in Halton county. He showed the film: Just Weeds, depicting the detriment of weeds in crops. Mr. Bradley asked for the co-operation of everyone who owns a piece of land, explaining that this is the only way we can hope for satisfactory results.

Outstanding Cow In K. Ella-Herd

One of the outstanding tested and producing cows of the Jersey breed is Sporting Standard Star—a cow in the herd of Kenneth L. Ella, Hornby. Sporting Standard Star was bred by Russell T. Morrison of Mouth of Keswick, N.B. and she has 4 tested daughters, that have the very high average of 11,096 lbs. of milk, 618 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 5.67. These are all figured on a mature equivalent basis for 305 days on 2 times milking.
