cubic feet and a 1935 objective of 50 new wells. A request from R. Healey for rental of the town grader at the Woolcombing Corporation was viewed favorably by Council. Members also acknowledged a circular from a machinery company with a power saw for sale. Council decided it wasn't in the market for a power saw.

Letters from Solicitors

A letter from the Ontario Provincial Police was read, expressing the opinion that there would be no change in the policy decision to withdraw provincials from towns of over 2000 population at the end of the year. Mayor Tyler said there has been information since then that the limit may be reconsidered and towns under 3500 made exempt.

A motion to purchase an early model car from E. McDowell for parts to the town's older fire engine was lost. Council heard two letters dealing with water damage complaints acting for W. Roberts and S. Messac in the Roberts' complaint over flooding from the creek at Main Street. It was suggested the town buy the complainant a lot and move the house. Council disclaimed responsibility here. In the Messac complaint, based on surface drainage damage, Council agreed to examine the drain situation.

Note Auditor's Report

An organization in Acton United Church, as a non-profit body, was refunded \$14 for town hall rental. A letter from Carroll's Grand Union Ltd. assured Council it would comply with suggestions that loading and unloading of supplies be made at the rear of the store. An assessment by law from the H.P.C., with amendments included by the town solicitor, was given first reading. Highlights of the auditor's report on the town for 1934 were read by the Mayor. It was noted the town had a deficit in the year of \$16,241 which was mainly attributed to road expense increases, rises in general expenses and maintenance cost on public buildings, higher police protection payments, well-drilling, some decrease in anticipated revenue and some increase in 1933's anticipated deficit.

Crack-Down on Parking

Mayor Tyler reported an interview with Beardmore officials regarding water searching on that company's land. Conclusion of the interview is to be pursued. A brief discussion followed on the advisability of dredging the local creek bed, but no definite decision reached.

Councillor C. Lindsay urged a crack-down on parking infractions. Councillor S. Brunell asked for check on Main Street tile in need of repair, while Councillor J. Newton suggested a pile of rubble in front of the town hall should be cleaned up.

Councillor Wick advised that water should be shut off at the arena and that snow fence should be stored in the curling rink rather than left outside. Councillor R. Langford presented a motion, which passed, authorizing payment of \$25 to the Y's Men's Club for a sign in the cost of advertising plates on Acton.

At the conclusion of Monday night's meeting Reeve Hargrave posed a question on Acton's share in the High School rate. The following accounts, totalling \$1,400.03 were passed for payment:
