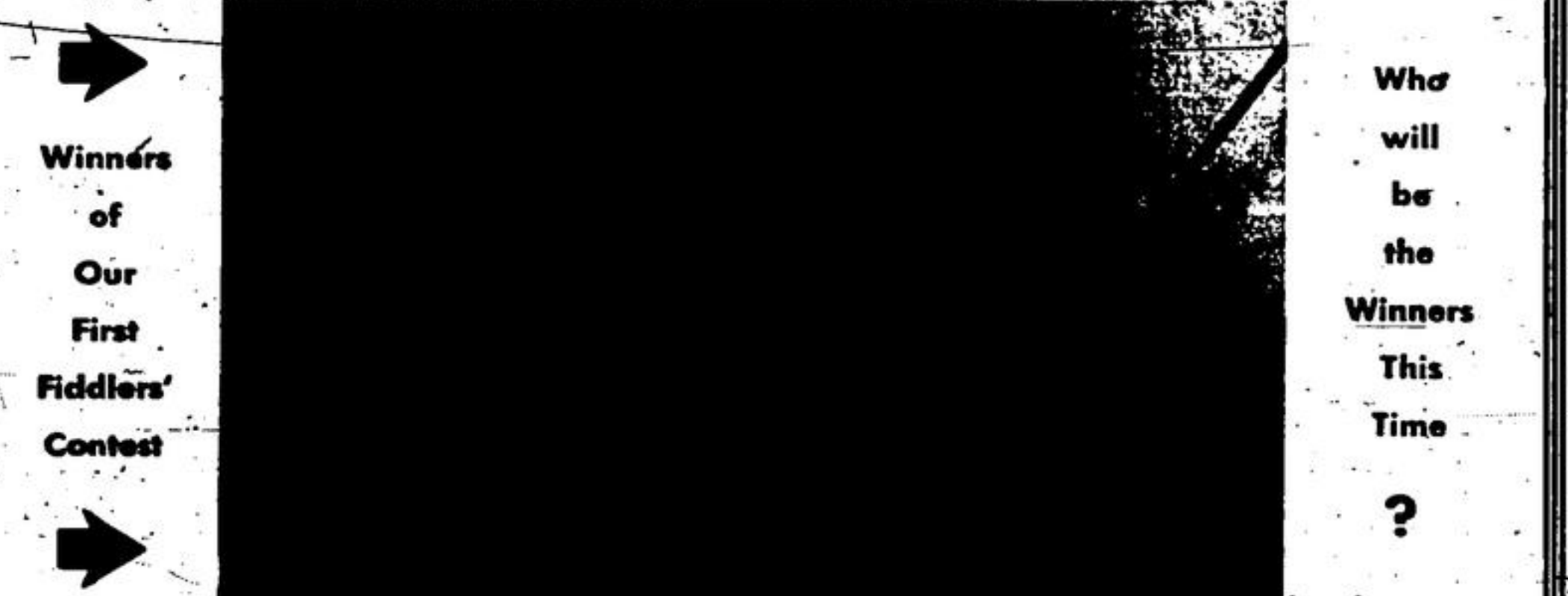
Mr. Jerome Hunter returned home during the week-end from his farm in the north, and plans on staying here for some time.
