QUEENSMEN ENTERTAIN ABOUT 200 IN CONCERT AT KNOX CHURCH TUES.

Other solos included My Message, a Scotch song Westerning Home, Little Jack Hammer sung in the style of Handel, a negro preacher's version of the story of David and Goliath and the aria Il Lacerato Spirito from Simon Boccanegra.

They sang several spirituals of which the most popular with the audience was Dry Bones. The Road Superintendent was to notify all patrolmen to store all snow fence in their division and report the number of rolls. No snow fence is to be lent out for private use.

All outstanding tax arrears are to be collected.

Council was in accord with the petition presented by the ratepayers regarding the straightening of the road on the seventh line at Berry's Hill.

Ronald Moodie secretary-treasurer of U.S.S. No. 2, Erin (Public School) was to be paid the sum of \$2,425, balance of 1934 school taxes. Jesse McLachlin was refunded \$635 error in 1934 taxes.

The Salvation Army was given the usual grant of \$25.

The following accounts were ordered paid: General, \$69.36; Relief, \$159.20; Sheep, \$53.60; Road, \$2,211.57, a total of \$2,973.13.

Bronte To Supply Part of Trafalgar

Bronte waterworks will supply Trafalgar west of the Twelve Mile Creek to the Nelson Line and north to the C.N.R. tracks.

That's part of the contract which Trafalgar Public Utilities have agreed to, said Chairman Gordon Leaver as he added that as soon as the Council puts its stamp of approval on the arrangement, laying of water mains to supply 30 residences on Radial Road and east of the village to Holydean Market would get underway.

"It would cost Trafalgar \$26,000 to pipe water across the Twelve Mile Creek," said Mr. Leaver, "and as Bronte already has water mains across it, the Township will be in money to buy water for the area west of the village from Bronte."

Mr. Leaver added that Township residents on Radial Road and living east of Bronte would pay water bills to the Township and not direct to Bronte. Master meters will record village water used by the Township both north and east of Bronte.
