## Quiet Record Of Community Service

Last week's news heading in the Free Press gave the information that six teachers had resigned from the Acton Public School staff.

In schools the size of Acton, staff changes are more or less routine every year. Among those resignations, however, was one teacher in particular whose resignation drew more than casual notation in many of those who have during the years attended Acton school.

For forty years Miss Daisy Folster has been teaching, and all but about a year and a half of those years were in Acton school. Miss Folster, whose work and example have touched so many people in the formative school years, holds a place comparable to that of Miss M. Z. Bennett. She was for many years Miss Bennett's second in command. As a matter of fact, after Miss Bennett's resignation as principal, Miss Folster was offered the principalship but she preferred to continue as a teacher in grade 7.

The writer went to Acton schools in the same classes in both public and high school and perhaps her termination of her life work arouses in others of those years, feelings that are akin regarding a lifetime in one community and the Acton of over 50 years ago. In those school years she was a conscientious student and through all the years has been loyal to Acton with the same faithfulness shown to her parents in their declining years.

Miss Folster took joy in the progress of her pupils—hers has been more than an interest in their academic advancement. She was interested in their guidance for life as worthy citizens as well. Forty years' teaching in Acton school; the years of childhood attending Acton schools and Miss Folster today is just as keenly interested in Acton's young people.

We join with hundreds of others not only in Acton but who have gone out from Acton into other parts of the world in wishing for Miss Daisy Folster many more happy years in the Acton in which her work has meant so much and her duties as a teacher been so graciously effective.—G. A. D.

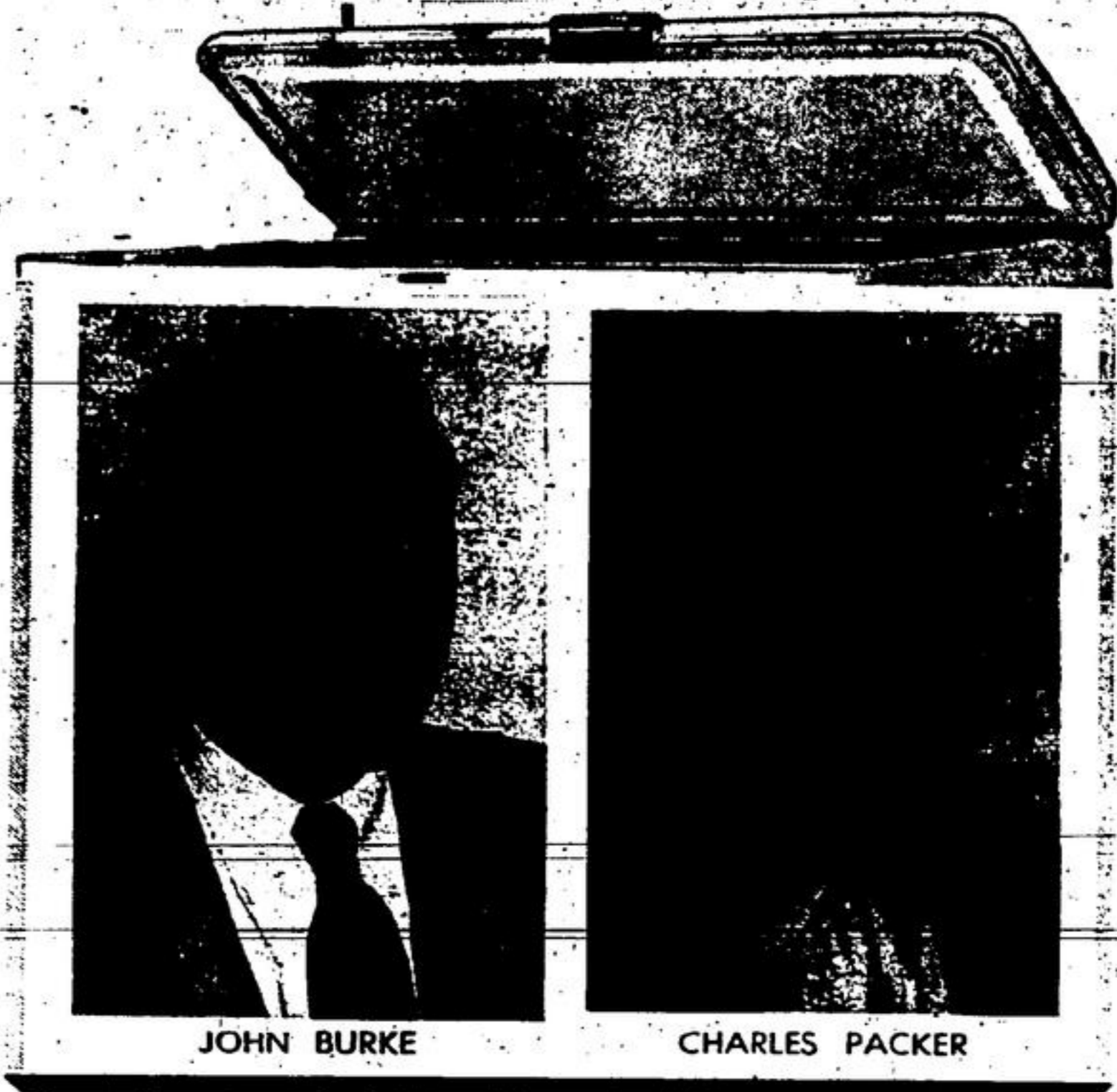
