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

Joe Jany Chosen To Fly To Ottawa

Joe Jany of Acton will join senior high school students selected by local Rotary clubs from the 10 provinces of Canada in the national capital as guests of Ottawa Rotary for a program that continues for four days. The aim is to promote the best type of Canadian citizenship among high school students, many of whom will be voters and leaders in the next half century.

He will leave Malton airport on May 16 for the "Adventure in Citizenship".

The program is varied. It includes addresses by prominent Members of Parliament, discussions led by University professors on democracy and the government of Canada, visits to places of national importance including the House of Commons while in session, presentation of Canadian Citizenship Certificates by the Prime Minister, a study of the National Capital Plan and certain social features.

Favorable reactions have tended to increase from year to year the number of students attending the project. In 1951 the number was 134; in 1954 the total was 174; for the present year there will be 180 with each of the ten provinces having student representation. This steady growth indicates a bright future for the project.

The Acton Rotary club has sent a high school student to Ottawa for the past several years. Last year's winner was Janice Baker.

Films shown dealt with wild animal life, including wild fowl, and their habits, along with insects, some with their destructive living on vegetation. Different species of the deer family were interesting as well as the buffalo and some of the northwest and districts adjacent to the Rocky Mountains were allotted to certain sections of park lands.

The last film shown dealt with Pacific Coast scenery, in forestry and lumbering, also dangers of forest fires, which are in some cases, due to carelessness such as cigarette stubs not properly put out, butts thrown away, or even matches.

During the picture show, Frank Schneider conducted a draw, when a few of those present were recipients of handsome prizes.

Defer Third Polio Injection, Include Grade Three Pupils

A change in the series of polio inoculations in Halton county has been announced this week following the recent much publicized report of Dr. Jonas Salk. The first and second graders who have already begun their series of three inoculations will wait seven months before the third.

The third injection is being delayed on the advice of Dr. Salk and the Department of Health officials in an effort to inoculate as many as possible.

Experiments have proven that a longer period between doses of vaccine give a more pronounced immunity.

Grade three pupils throughout the county will be inoculated shortly, but no definite time can be set as yet.

He made the inquiry when an account for micro-filming work was presented. He felt it was money wasted, having this work done by others when council approved of the purchase of such a recording machine.

Work had been delayed when it was learned the Inspector of Legal Offices did not favor the remodeling of the registry office basement to provide a micro-filming room and additional storage space, as previously agreed upon by council. Members still felt the work should be proceeded with as registry offices in other centres were utilizing basement space. The committee were requested to proceed with the work.

Emphasizing there were numerous beauty spots in Halton which could be utilized as park areas, Warden R. H. Shannon asked the reforestation committee and the auspices of the committee to investigate the possibility of establishing park areas in Halton under new legislation set up by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

The Warden also reminded council that a by-law to establish a county employee pension plan had been given two readings in 1950. He felt the finance committee should review the by-law for further consideration. "All the counties surrounding Halton have an authorized pension scheme for their employees," the warden added.

Reeve Robert Marshall, Trafalgar, and Deputy Reeve Sidney Childs, Milton, were appointed county representatives to the Halton Children's Aid Society for 1955-56.

Council agreed by resolution the Attorney General's Department is to be notified that Halton is now prepared to establish a separate office for the use of a County Probation Officer and now await for his appointment.

Members unanimously supported a resolution sponsored by Reeve Robert Marshall and Reeve A. R. Service, Nassagaweya, seeking to have the Ontario Department of Highways take over the portion of the Second Line, Trafalgar, between Bronte and Highway 25 at Palgrave. On other occasions council had made similar requests to the Department but to date the request had not been granted.
