The Currie's of Georgetown were Sunday visitors with Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Smith a week ago.

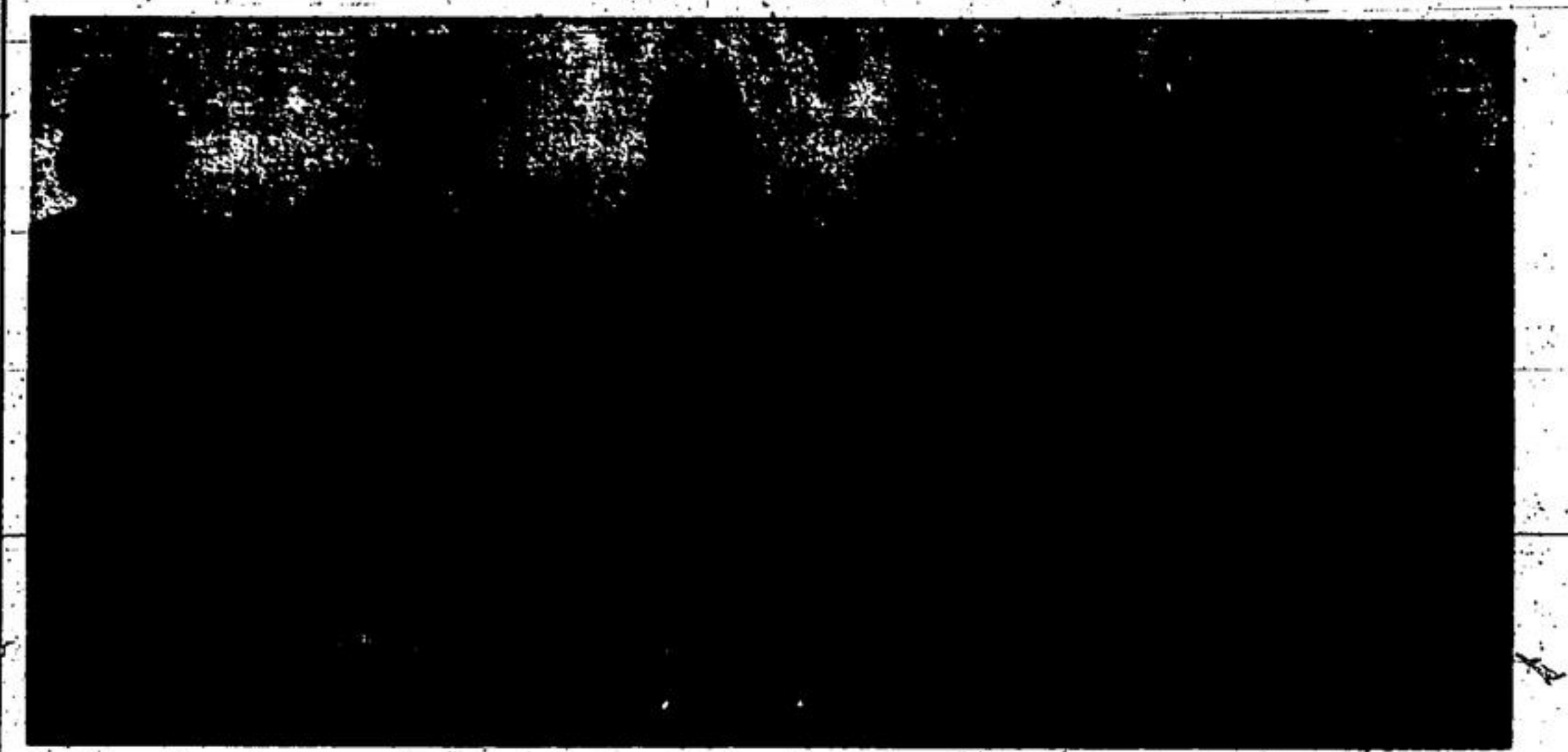
Mrs. Smethurst spent a few days with the John Smethurst's at Islington this week.
