At Monday's Scout meeting Dave Peal and Bill Johnson received their second class badges.

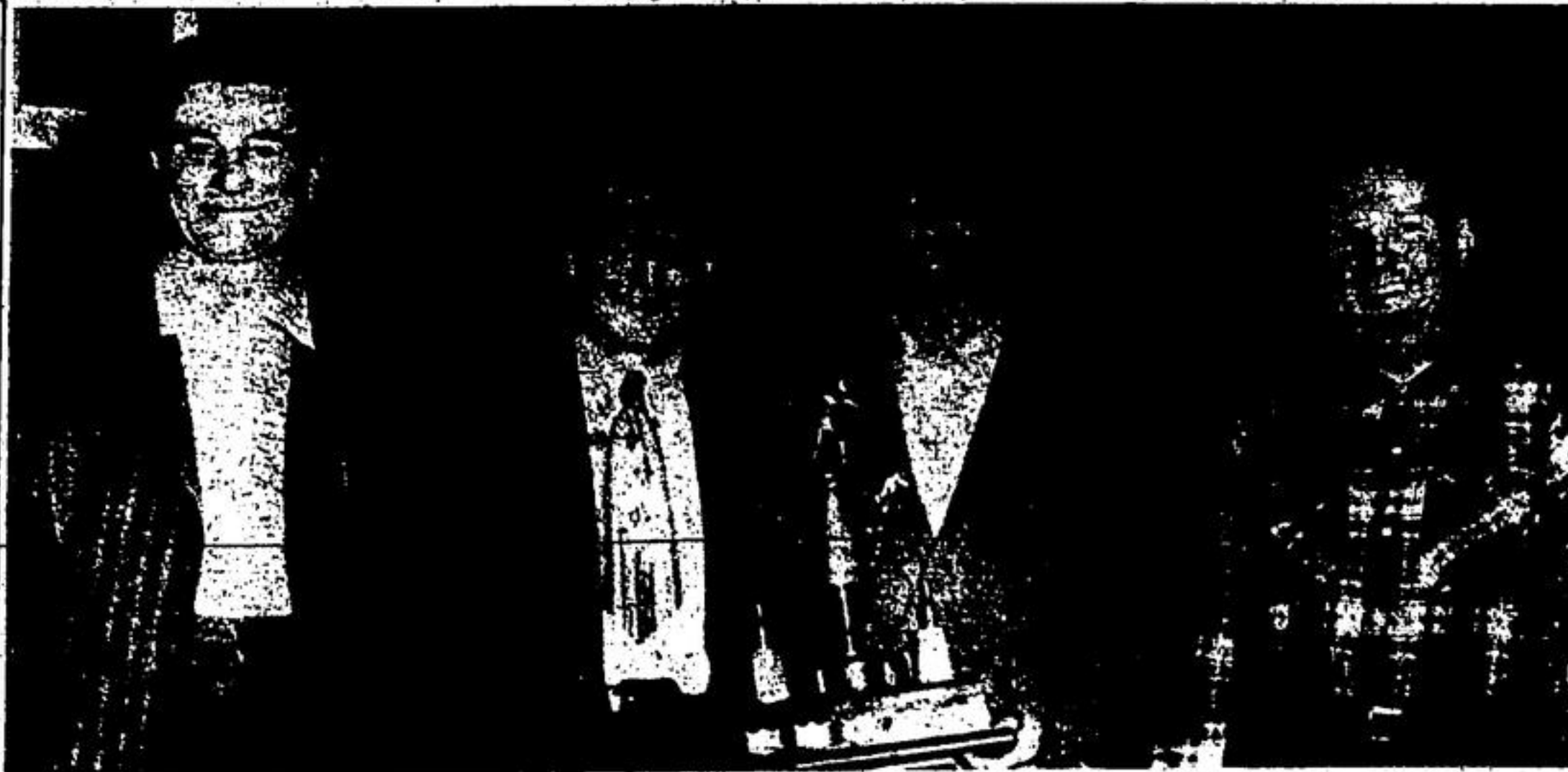

Mrs. W. N. Brownridge, president, opened the meeting with a welcome to delegates, members and friends.

The worship service, based on the theme "The Christian Hope" was conducted by Miss Margaret A. Scrimgeour, B.A., Missionary on furlough from Trinidad.

The speaker said that sometimes a challenge to the belief in the Resurrection is raised but that this belief matters greatly. To live a "good life" is not enough. There must be that "extra" the faith, the hope which the Christian has and others have not. Thus out of the Resurrection is the greatest essential, the Christian Hope, she said.
