Answered Muster When War Declared

George Green, who was one of the original 20 men who joined up together in Acton when war was declared in 1914, passed away at his home, 50 Main St., Acton, on May 23. He had been ill for the past seven years. Bill Lee of the Halton Rifles sounded the muster on his trumpet and 20 Acton men enlisted on August 14, 1914. They went overseas with the 4th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force. Fred Wright of Acton was also among the original group. Mr. Green was discharged on April 12, 1919 in Toronto.

He came to Acton 45 years ago from England, where he was born at Walsall in 1893. Except for his war service, he made his home in Acton since then. He was an employee of Beardmore Co.

In 1930 he was married in Toronto to Ellen Green, who survives him. He was a member of the Church of England. Rev. E. Jones conducted the funeral service at the Rumley Funeral Home on May 28. Members of the Canadian Legion paid tribute to the former soldier at the military funeral.

Interment was in Fairview cemetery, Acton. Pallbearers were nephews Charles Holmes, David Holmes, Frank Holmes, George Holmes, Charlie Green and Sam Scutcheon. Surviving Mr. Green, as well as his wife, are brothers and sisters in England.
