**Will Distribute Magazines From Trafalgar Site**

Modern Romances, Modern Screen and 84 other publications of Modern Distributors Limited will be distributed from and probably later published on the Queen Elizabeth Way just west of Oakville's Kerr Street.  
 The company, with headquarters in Cincinnati and a warehouse on Wellington St. in Toronto, last week purchased Leonard De Board's 10 1/2-acre farm on the south side of the Q. E. Way, with William Terentiak, manager of the J. P. Curran Real Estate office as the middleman in the deal.  
 De Board said after the deal was consummated that a company official told him he was planning to build a warehouse of 4,000 square feet floor space and later to add a printing plant. At present Modern Screen and its literary kin are merely distributed in Canada and printed in the United States. The company also handles comics and "funny" papers.

**Say Town Manager Plan Works As Oakville Delegates Visit Falls**

The town manager system, which Oakville is considering, is giving splendid satisfaction in Niagara Falls, Deputy-reeve Ernest Savip told the Oakville council at its meeting recently. With Councillors W. E. Davis and Wm. Card, the deputy-reeve paid a visit to the Falls and interviewed Mr. Orr, the Cataract City's town manager, to obtain an idea as to how the system operated.  
 "Mr. Orr seemed to think that we are on the right track," said Mr. Savip. "The system seems to be very well organized. I think they have a very good set-up. Mr. Orr has been on the job 17 years. He said there isn't one member of the council who would want to go back to the old system."  
 Reeve Haldenby thought that as council's summer recess was so close at hand, no action should be taken at the present time, but that preliminary plans should be made and applicants interviewed with a view to instituting the system in September.

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**Street Condition Brings Complaint**

The town of Brampton may be involved in a law suit over the condition of Union street, according to A. K. Aziz, director of the Brampton Knitting Mills. Mr. Aziz said last week if conditions of the street are not improved, his company will possibly take court action against the town, and that any suit against the municipality would be for a considerable amount of damages.  
 After hearing complaints from the company, the works department had Union street oiled on May 14 after, according to Deputy-reeve Fred Kline, "going to some considerable trouble to do so." Mr. Aziz claims the oil on the by-pass improved conditions for about one-half hour and then evaporated.

**Streetsville Sets Lower Mill Rate**

Working until after one o'clock Thursday of last week, Streetsville council arrived at its 1955 tax rate of 58 mills, one mill lower than last year.  
 Largest item in the budget other than for general purposes of the village set at \$35,146 or 23.04 mills was the final estimate of the Public School Board of \$31,040 or 20.23 mills. Council sliced \$5,500 from the school board budget because of a \$3,500 over-payment on a recent school debenture and \$2,000 for capital expenditure.  
 Retirement of village debentures necessitated a levy of 3.30 mills or \$5,034. Brampton Area High School Board 4.38 mills or \$6,721. County rate, 5.64 mills or \$8,600. Planning Board, \$622 or .41 mill, and an even mill for the Library Board providing \$1,520.

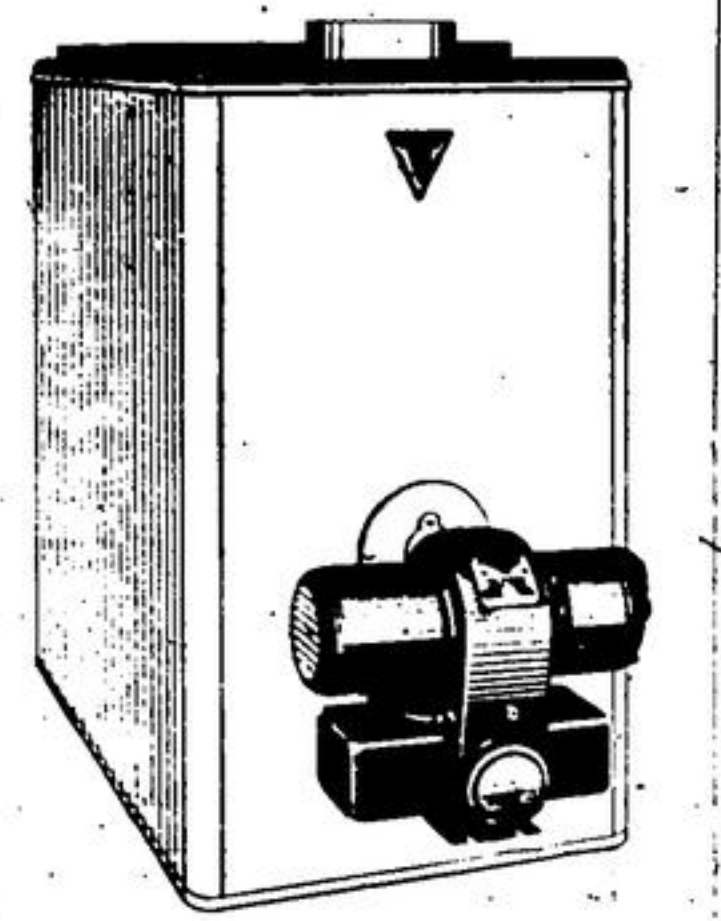
**Trafalgar Police Add Seventh Constable**

Trafalgar Police Department has increased its staff to seven constables, as radio operators Vaughan Craig and John Walsh have been named third class officers.  
 The two radio operators will be replaced by police cadets, who will advance in the ranks as vacancies occur, or replacements are needed. Constable James Collins is leaving the force.  
 The former radio men will join Chief Fred Oliver, Sgt. Harry Wilson, Constable Al Terrell, Constable Thomas Souter and Constable Robert Mansfield.

**Georgetown Purchases Cruiser Increases Lot Size Requirements**

Lowest of three tenders for supplying a Georgetown police cruiser. Bowers Motor Sales made the sale to Georgetown council last week.  
 The town is purchasing a Plymouth cruiser and the black two-door model will be delivered next month. Total cost of the cruiser is \$1,917.90.  
 Future houses built in Georgetown will have more land area, according to a building-by-law amendment passed at the meeting. A new house must now have a lot of at least 5,000 square feet, compared with 4,000 formerly. Frontage requirement of 50 ft. remains in force.  
 A second by-law amendment sets the distance which a house must be placed from the road boundary at 25 ft. A house built on a corner lot is allowed to be within 10 ft. of the side road boundary.  
 Discussing with solicitor, George Hewson on a subdivision by-law, it was decided to give more consideration to this before making any move. Mr. Hewson read the new Oakville by-law and mentioned other municipalities which have regulations for subdivisions.  
 Possibility of having the town industrial roads and streets under a 24 hour engineer's supervision, with the subdivision paying costs was mentioned. Some towns require a payment per lot for schools, as high as \$25 and this may be considered in Georgetown.

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**TWO EQUAL 100 WINNIPEG (CP) - CPR** engineer Robert Binney chalked up 49 years and 10 months service on his retirement this month. Including the long service of his father, R. M. Binney Sr., it brought the family service to 100 years. The elder Binney was a section foreman when his son started in 1905.

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**Canteen Service In New Facility**

OSHAWA, Ont. (CP) — Mrs. C. S. Lee created a "new look" in service when she founded a Red Cross canteen service for a Whitty Old people's home two years ago.  
 Hope Hulmehead of Toronto, vice-chairman of the Ontario Red Cross Welfare Committee, says the canteen has set a pattern for service in old people's homes which may be copied throughout the province.  
 Such canteens are not usually found in such homes but now each new home built in Ontario will be equipped with one.  
 Mrs. Lee's canteen at Fairview Lodge in nearby Whitty drew assistance from many women's organizations. Volunteers from church groups, the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire and the Eastern Star donate their services.  
 Two weekly visits are made to the home by canteen volunteers dispensing coffee, cookies, good cheer and little services for the residents.  
 Mrs. Lee organized a shopping service. Residents list articles they wanted each week and volunteers purchased and delivered them the following week.  
 "I've spent hours selecting cards, matching wool and embroidery thread, trying to fill the multitude of little requests so important to shut-ins," she said.

**Burden Of Debt Lowest Of 30 Years**

The burden of Canada's national debt is lower now than at any time in the past 30 years, says the current issue of the Bank of Nova Scotia Monthly Review, which deals with the course of the national debt over the postwar period and with the debt's general significance in the economy.  
 According to the Review, the experience of the past quarter century clearly shows that the burden of the debt is most severe when business conditions are stagnant and that even an inflated debt can be shouldered without undue difficulty by an expanding economy.  
 Despite the fact that the direct interest-bearing debt is now more than four times as large as in 1938, the "carrying charges" represent a smaller proportion of the aggregate income of the country than at any time since before the First World War. The Review concludes that the reappearance of deficits in the Canadian government budget is not alarming in itself but might prove so if the rate of growth of the economy were seriously reduced and if the deficit continued for some time.  
 The Review points out that the origin of the debt can be summed up in two words: war and depression. Of the present debt of \$14,500 million, about \$11,000 million can be attributed to the Second World War, \$2,000 million to the First World War, and \$1,500 million to the depression.

**Largest Furnace Production Soon**

The largest general purpose porcelain enamelling furnace in North America will go into production in Streetsville soon, to supply a new need in Canada's building industry. Under construction at the new Graham Bell Ltd. plant, now nearing completion, the furnace is a product of the latest research in the field of porcelain enamelling.  
 One of its major uses will be the manufacture of architectural porcelainized steel panels for the growing needs of Canadian industrial and commercial building expansion.  
 In addition to architectural porcelain, the company will manufacture high-temperature ceramic coatings for use in both industrial and national defense projects. A possible market for the material is in atomic energy installations, officials said.

**Park Is Picnickers Mecca**

While the season is still early, Trafalgar's Coronation Park, on the lake west of Oakville, is already attracting visitors. A good number of Oakville and Trafalgar people, plus a number of tourists, visited the attractive spot over the holiday week-end.  
 "We have quite a few picnickers booked for the season, including local organizations and industrial employees' groups," said R. C. A. Cumberland, chairman of the Trafalgar parks commission. Fifteen picnic tables have been added to those in use last year, making a total of 30, while the barbecue fireplaces have been increased from three to six. George Pollock is park superintendent and David Smith assistant superintendent.

**TOO BUSY TO FISH**

HALIFAX (CP) — Bill Cameron, who was an avid trout fisherman for 20 years ago, he decided to work with trout all the time, joining the staff of the federal fish hatchery here. Now he's so busy getting troutlets ready for other fishermen he hasn't a chance to wet a line himself.

**Promising Singer Young Schoolgirl**

London, Ont. (CP) — A 14-year-old high school student here is on her way to a career in modern "pop" singing.  
 Priscilla Wright, grade 10 student, made her singing debut in a high school show. A few weeks ago she signed a contract with a Canadian recording company to cut two records.  
 Her father is Don Wright, well-known leader of the Don Wright radio chorus and author of books on choral teaching which have been adapted in schools across Canada.  
 Mr. Wright discovered Priscilla's singing talents some months ago when he made a record and sent it to Toronto for audition. The company signed her on contract, saying she has something in her voice that should make her records popular.  
 Mr. Wright describes his daughter's voice as that of a 27-year-old pop singer, but with additional warmth and tone.
