**CITIZENS PLEASE BE ADVISED**

Pursuant to the Weed Control Act, 1937, R.S.O. Notice is hereby given that every occupant of land and the owners of unoccupied land and alleyways within the County of Halton must destroy noxious weeds thereon as often as may be necessary to prevent the ripening of their seed, and to keep such lands free from noxious weeds during the summer.

In the event of this notice not being complied with within the month of June the county will proceed under the Act with the destruction of these weeds and charging the cost of same to the respective owners.
