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Fine Weavers Capture Prizes
 Fredericton (CP)—The director of handicrafts for the province reports that New Brunswick exhibitors of weaving captured four prizes at the national exhibition of weavers at London, Ont.
 Mrs. Adele Ives took top honors for her curtain and scatter-rug entries and Mrs. Ann Onno captured a prize for her linen table runner. In a special section for men weavers, Prof. Ellis Rouleston of Mount Allison University topped his division with a skirt.
 The New Brunswick weavers were requested to take part in a special showing in Alberta, and the Halifax Weavers Guild has asked that the winning entries be shown in Nova Scotia.

Halton County Beavers Effective "Engineers Of The Forests"

Dry wells, dry stream beds, not water for irrigation. In sections of Halton County, these things are fast becoming a thing of the past, through a gigantic long range program of water conservation.
 Several years ago, officers of the Department of Lands and Forests, headed by County Game Warden Dudley Hitecock, released three northern beaver in the wilderness section of north-west Halton County. Today these original three animals have increased their numbers over 1,000 per cent, and have built dams retaining millions of gallons of water.
 Although proving an inconvenience at times, because of flooded roads, the value of the works of these industrial engineers of the forest is almost incalculable. For the county to have undertaken the construction of similar projects would have entailed a financial outlay running into untold thousands of dollars, according to Mr. Hitecock.
 The job is now done, and is being maintained at no cost and probably much more efficiently than if constructed by man," he declared this week. "Where once narrow little streams ran among the rocks, now expansive lakes, providing water and food for the wild life abounding in the area, are to be found."
 Once scarce ducks and geese are again feeding in the sector. With the aid of the Department of Lands and Forests conservation men who stocks the streams and ponds each year, the once diminishing supply of speckled and rainbow trout is again flourishing, he said.
 Wells as far as six miles south of Milton, that once ran dry each summer, are now maintaining their water levels.
 Once scarce during the dry spells, a plentiful supply of water is available for irrigation purposes.
 Yes, these "engineers of the forests" live up to the axiom associated with their name. They are as "busy as beavers" ever building and improving the few remaining acres of natural beauty in the area as they continue their long-range program of conservation.

Work Continues On Refuse Plant

Work is proceeding on the site of Trafalgar township's new sewage disposal plant on the north side of the Lakeshore highway, west of the Fourth Line, and a number of trees have been removed.
 The plant is to be completed by November 1, and in operation by November 30. Tenders will be called for the laying of trunk sewers as soon as the Oakville council decides whether or not to join the town's sewers with the township system.
 A proposal from the township to process the town's sewage at a rate of 27 cents per thousand gallons is being considered by the town. This would involve a contribution of \$71,000 by the town towards the cost of the trunk main.

15,000 Attend Farm, Home Week

More than 15,000 of Ontario's rural people attended the Farm and Home Week program at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, from June 7 to June 10.
 The president of the O.A.C., Dr. J. D. MacLachlan, in welcoming the visitors, pointed out that since its inception before the turn of the century, Farm and Home Week has grown into an annual event which enables Ontario farm people to keep "up to date" with the latest farm practices and research information through demonstrations and discussions with staff members.
 The program, essentially the same each day, included a livestock review featuring animals selected from the college herds and tractor and safety demonstrations staged by the Department of Agricultural Engineering. These demonstrations showed how tragic accidents can often result from the neglect of simple safety precautions when using machinery and appliances.
 The day was brought to a close with visits by bus to the various departments, where exhibits could be studied and problems discussed with staff members. For the ladies, MacDonald Institute provided many exhibits in household science, ranging from trends in textiles and sewing methods to table settings and diet advice.

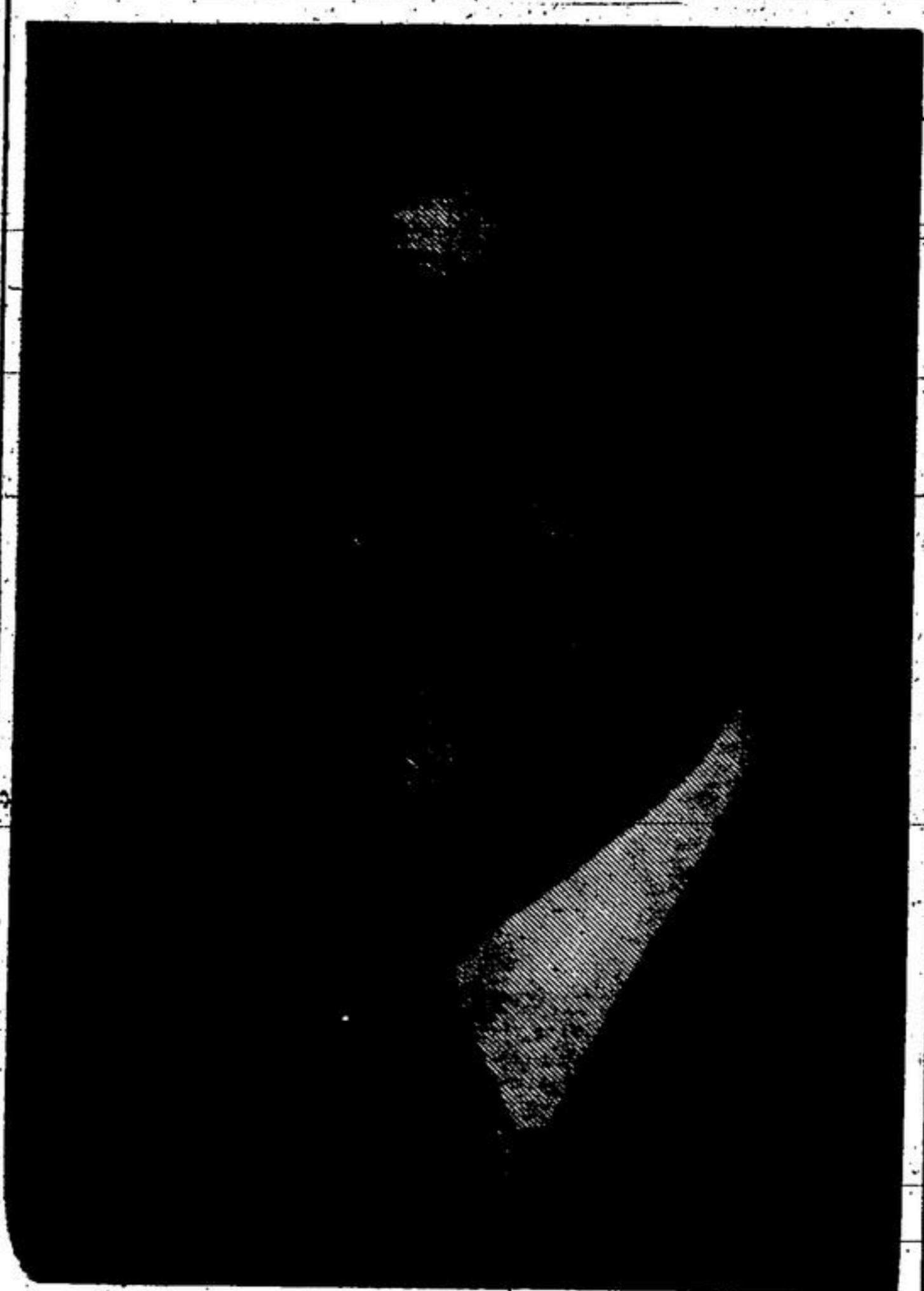
