Imaginary Trip Through Ethiopia

Acton Junior Institute and Acton Junior Farmers took an imaginary trip to Ethiopia at their meeting on Wednesday evening, June 8, at the home of Bill Thompson, Mrs. J. Ringler, an Acton public school teacher, was introduced as guest speaker by Mrs. Norman Turner at the joint meeting.

In her talk to the group, Mrs. Ringler took them in imagination to Ethiopia, where she lived at one time for three years. She described Ethiopia as a mountainous country about the same size as Ontario. The people living there are of the same race as the Jews and Arabs and in 1936 they were conquered by Italy. The Italian occupation in some respects helped Ethiopia, as the Italians built roads. Until that time there were not very many roads and what ones they had, were narrow and very poor. Today the Italian roads are very much in need of repairs.

Most of the population of Ethiopia is engaged in agriculture and Mrs. Ringler said the methods are very primitive compared with ours. Few people own automobiles. She pointed out one would see more cars around Addis-Ababa than any place else.

At the conclusion of her talk Mrs. Ringler passed around the group many things she brought back from Ethiopia, which ranged from hats, musical instruments, right down to an alligator spear, all these the works of the Ethiopians.

At the Junior Institute meeting, the girls discussed the various mistakes that are made, and the correct method.

At the Junior Farmer's meeting, Don Matthews, immediate past county president of the Halton Junior Farmers, topic was hay making. He outlined the different methods of handling hay, starting back to the days of pitching it on a wagon from a coil. Following this was the hay loader, then buck rakes, hay balers which are probably the most popular in this area and the most recent method of hay making is the Forage Harvester. A discussion followed later.
